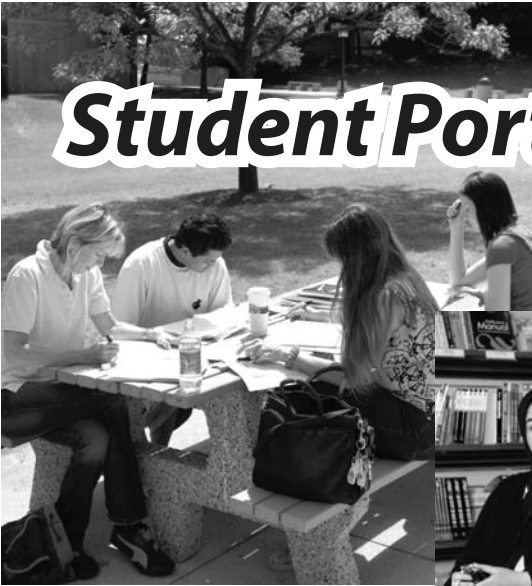

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Student Portrait Fall Semester 2008

Executive Summary

The Student Portrait provides answers to the most frequently asked questions about our student body and allows college decision makers to anticipate student needs and expectations. It contains a section on regional/state level comparative data, a second section that contains demographic and selected other tables for our total headcount, and a third section devoted to credit enrollment only.

Highlights:

- College of DuPage began in 1967 with **2,619** students. The enrollment reached its peak in 1991 with **36,322** students. Now, it currently stands at **28,230**.
- For Fall 2008, total headcount decreased by 0.5% from the previous Fall Term. Credit headcount decreased by 0.4%. Full-Time Equivalent Student (FTES) enrollment increased 2.1% to 14,913.
- The average (mean) age of all students is 30 years, and the median is 23 years. The mean age of credit students is 28 years and the median is 22 years. The mode is 19 years for both groups.
- Thirty-seven percent of credit students are in the traditional student age category of 18-20 years of age; 44% are 21-39 years of age; 17% are 40 years of age or older of whom 2% are over 64 years of age. One percent are 17 years of age or less.
- The proportion of minority students at the college remained stable at 34% and minority population of credit students is stable at 33%.
- The proportion of full-time credit students has increased to 38%. There are 15,786 (62%) part-time credit students.
- About 14,000 credit students (55%) indicate they plan to graduate from the college, and over 13,000 students (52%) indicate they plan to transfer to a four-year institution.
- The top five occupational programs by declared major are: 1) Nursing ADN, 1086 students; 2) Accounting, 465 students; 3) Fire Science Technology, 382 students; 4) Diagnostic Medical Imaging Radiography, 348 students; and 5) Early Childhood Education and Care, 327 students. These are self-declared majors and may not reflect actual enrollment in limited admission programs such as nursing. There are 16 limited admission programs out of 27 in the Health Sciences programs.
- About 4,300 (16%) of our credit students have an Associate's or higher degree. Eighty nine have a Doctorate; 837 have a Master's Degree; 2,282 have a Bachelor's Degree; and 1,073 have an Associate's Degree.

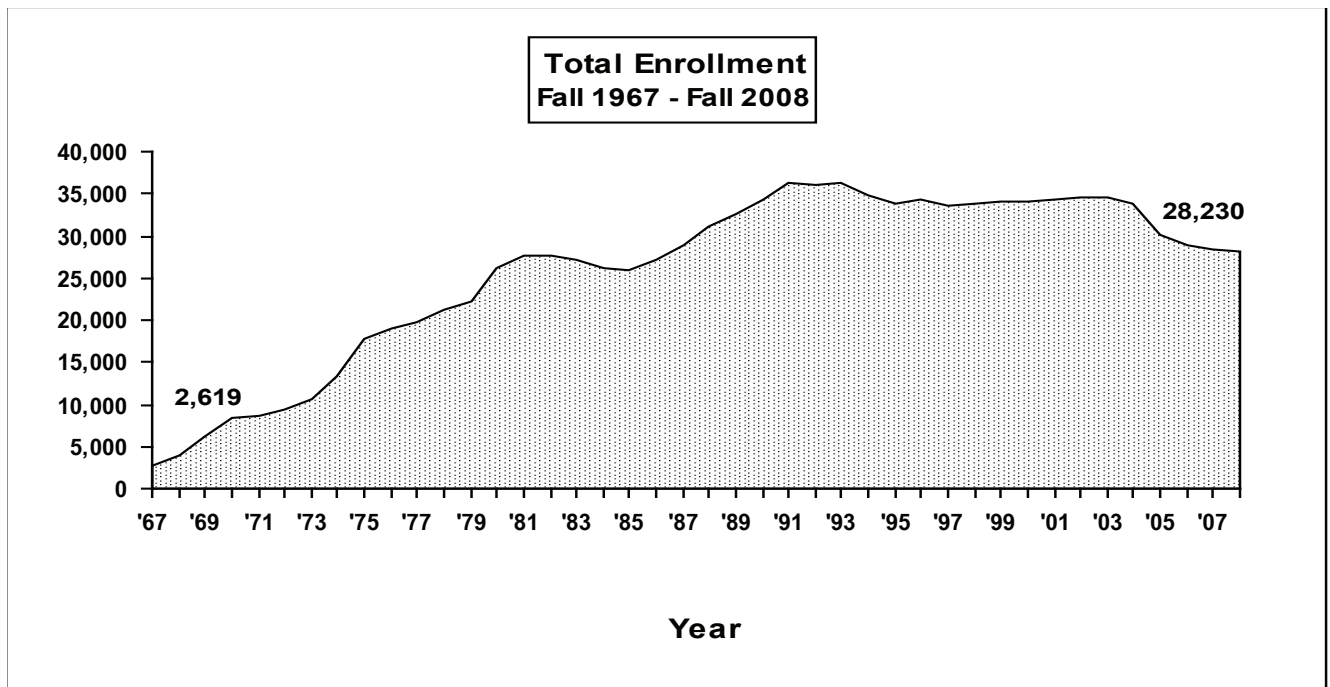
Enrollment History and Trends

Introduction

The 2008 Student Portrait profiles College of DuPage’s Fall Semester 2008 student body. It is organized to answer a series of commonly asked questions about our current students. It provides information for the college decision-makers in order to anticipate student needs and expectations.

The first section contains a brief history of the college’s enrollment and a comparison of enrollments with other Illinois community colleges. The second section has trend data of the 10th Day “snapshots” for the past 5 years—credit and non-credit. It shows the age, ethnicity, gender and also their residency, how they register for classes, and when and where they take classes. The third section is devoted to demographics and characteristics of the 25,668 credit students. It shows their major field of study, their plans to graduate/transfer, their education level, where they come from, and their course-taking pattern. Five year trend data are also included for these students.

From 1985 to 1991, College of DuPage’s total Fall enrollment grew to a record-breaking 36,322 students. The enrollment stayed over thirty-six thousand until 1993. Enrollment declined thereafter and leveled off. Since Fall 2004 enrollment has been further declining, (largely as a result of the conversion from quarters to semesters) and this Fall it is 28,230. The graph below presents the Fall 10th Day total headcount since the college began in 1967.



Fall 1967 to Fall 2004 – Quarter System, Fall 2005 onwards – Semester System

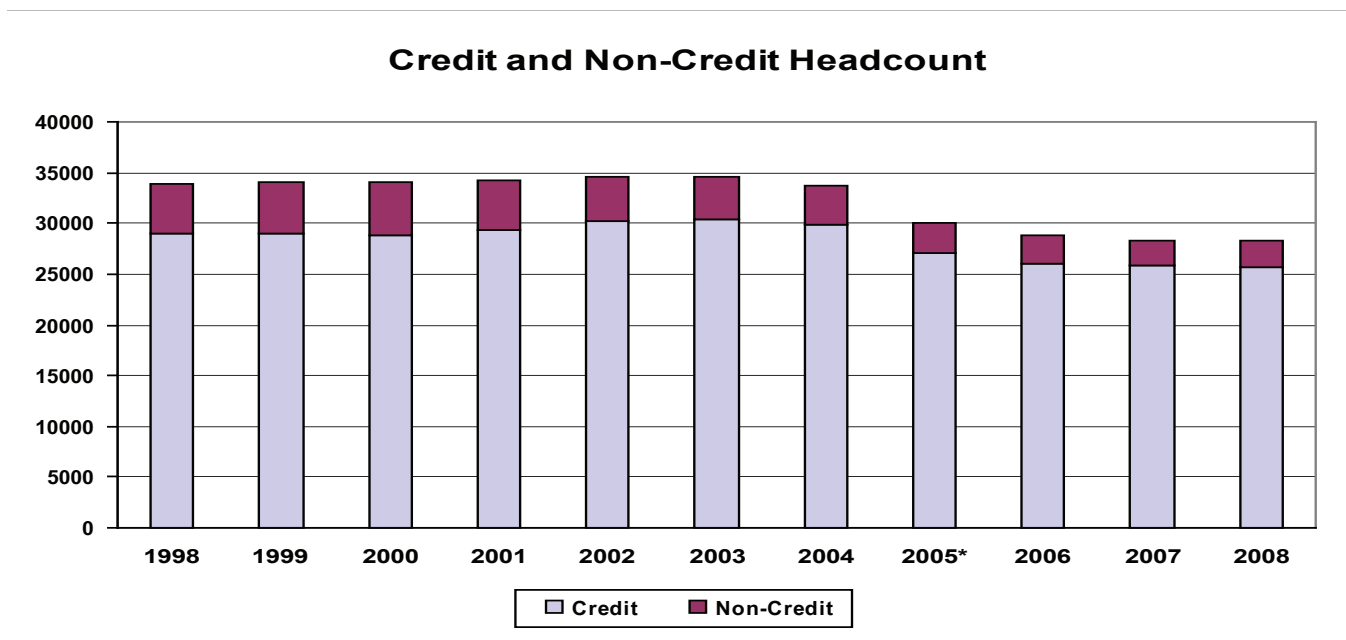
Credit and Non-Credit Enrollment

The enrollment history of the Fall Term credit, non-credit, and total students since 1998 is presented in the table below. In addition, the full-time equivalent students (FTES) are indicated. The percent of change from the previous year is included for each category. The credit headcount of 25,668 is lower (-0.4%) than last year's credit headcount of 25,768. The FTES increased by 1.2% to 14,913. Non-credit headcount has decreased by 1.2% to 2,562. Total headcount has increased by 2.1%. Students who take both credit and non-credit courses are counted as credit students. Substantial non-credit enrollment occurs after 10th Day.

How do College of DuPage's enrollment patterns compare with other Illinois community colleges?

Data provided by the Illinois Community College Board (ICCB) reveal a variety of enrollment changes. Of the 48 community colleges in Illinois, 22 colleges experienced increases in headcount, while 26 exhibited decreases during the past year— College of DuPage being one of them with 0.4% decrease for Fall 2008 over the previous Fall Term. Overall, state-wide community college enrollment numbers increased (1.9%) from the Fall of 2007. The table below displays the Fall Term **credit** headcount and the percent of change over the past three years of community colleges in the Chicago-land area. Please note Fall 2008 data is preliminary, changes are not anticipated.

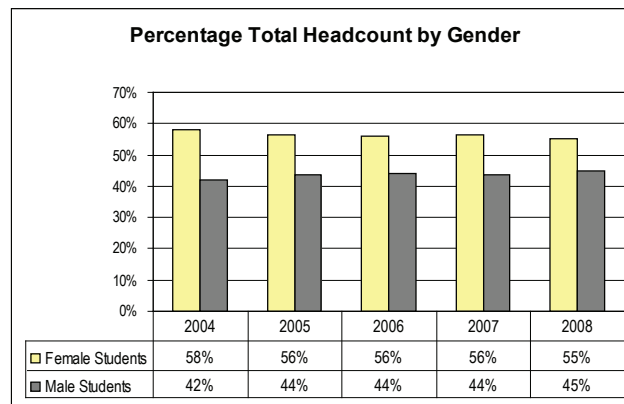

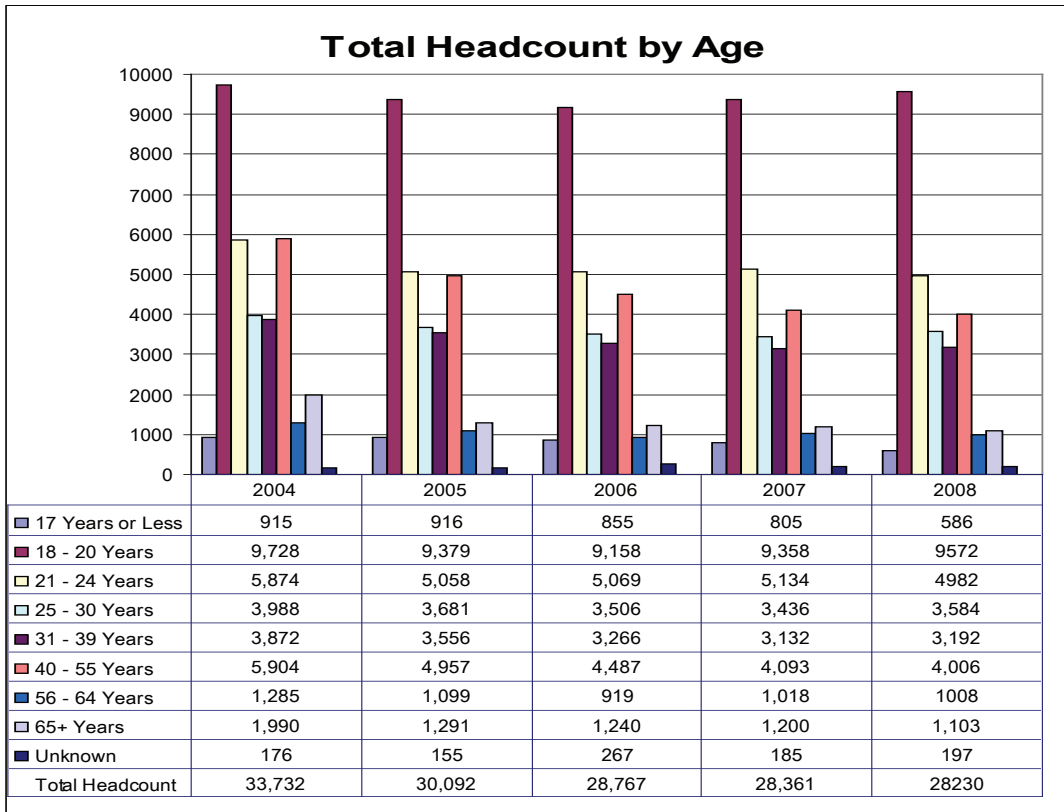

As enrollments began dropping from 2004 to 2005, the percentage of male students rose. This trend has continued and suggests that College of DuPage lost more female students after the semester conversion.

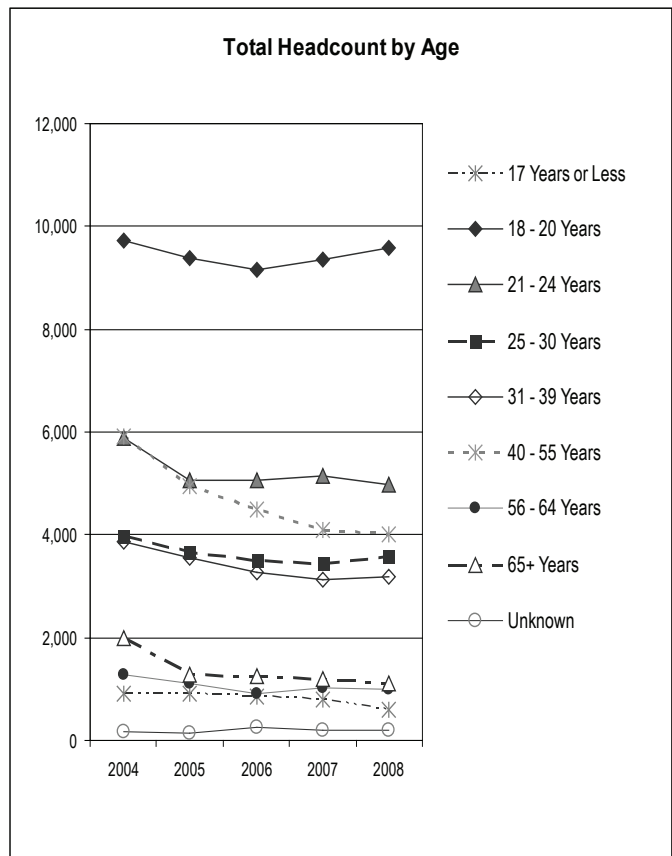


Total Headcount by Age

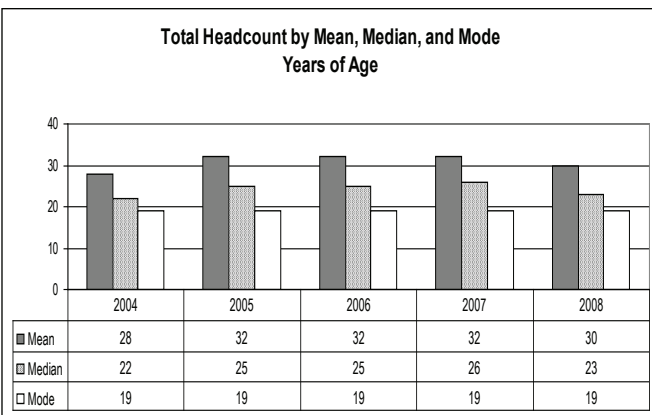

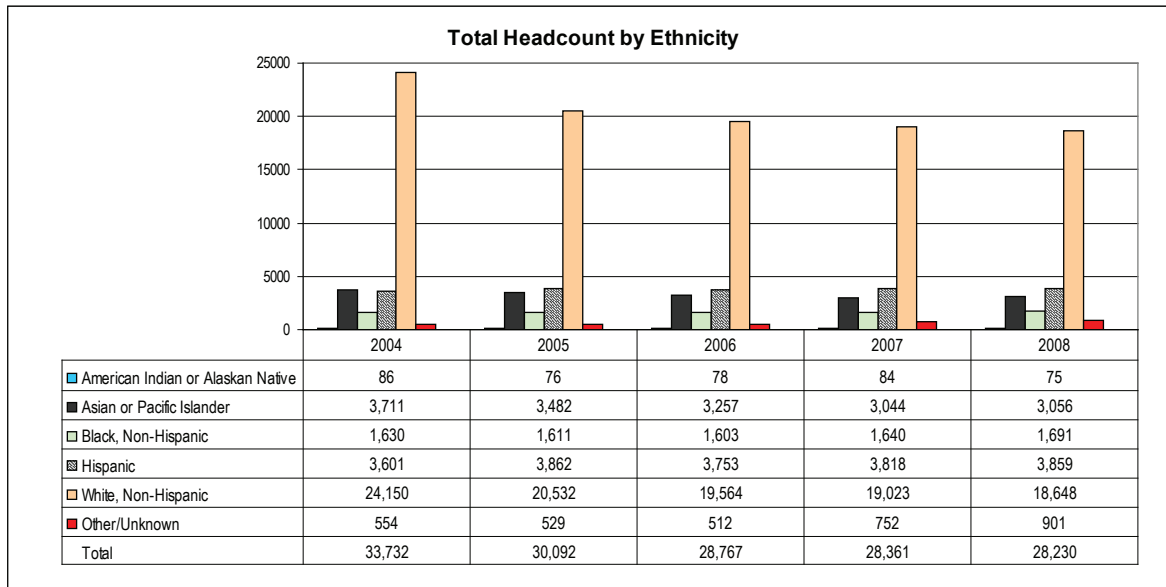
The most frequent age (mode) of College of DuPage students is 19. Although the numbers in all age ranges have dropped, they appear to be stabilizing and the relative positions remain unchanged. The age 40 to 55 group continued to drop more severely and continued to decrease in 2007; however, it too is flattening.



Total Headcount by Mean, Median, and Mode Years of Age

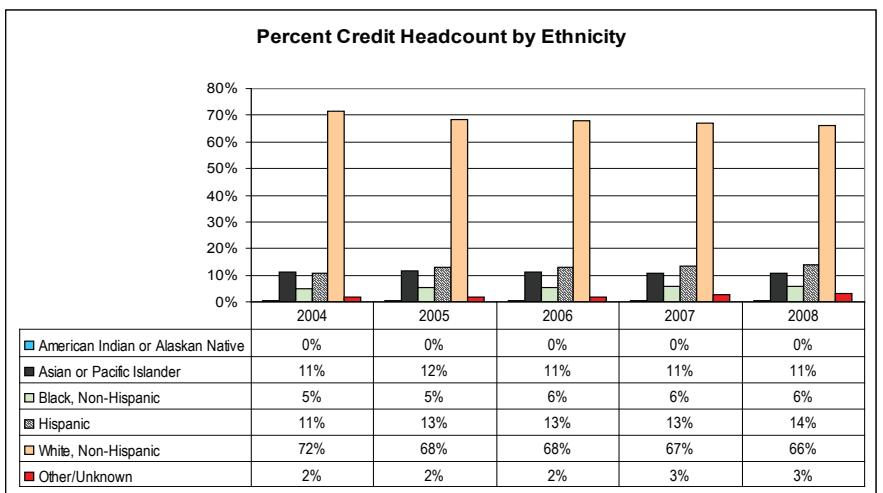
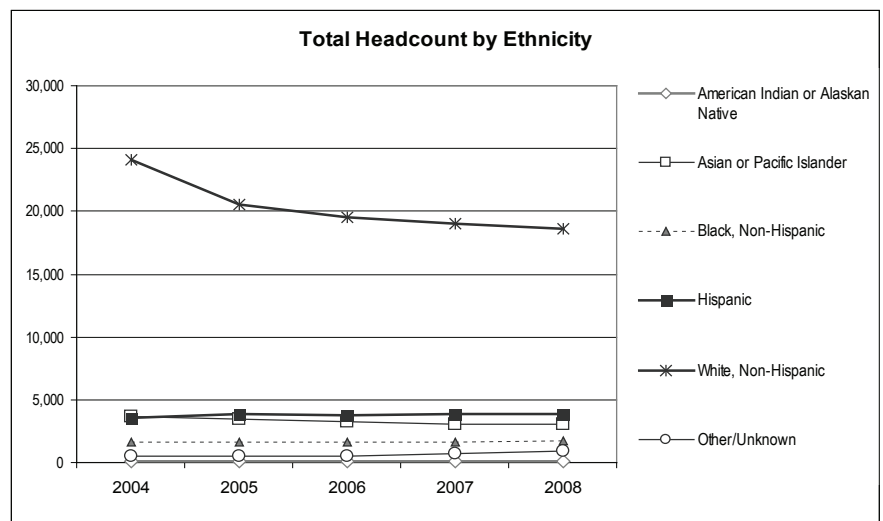


Total Headcount by Ethnicity

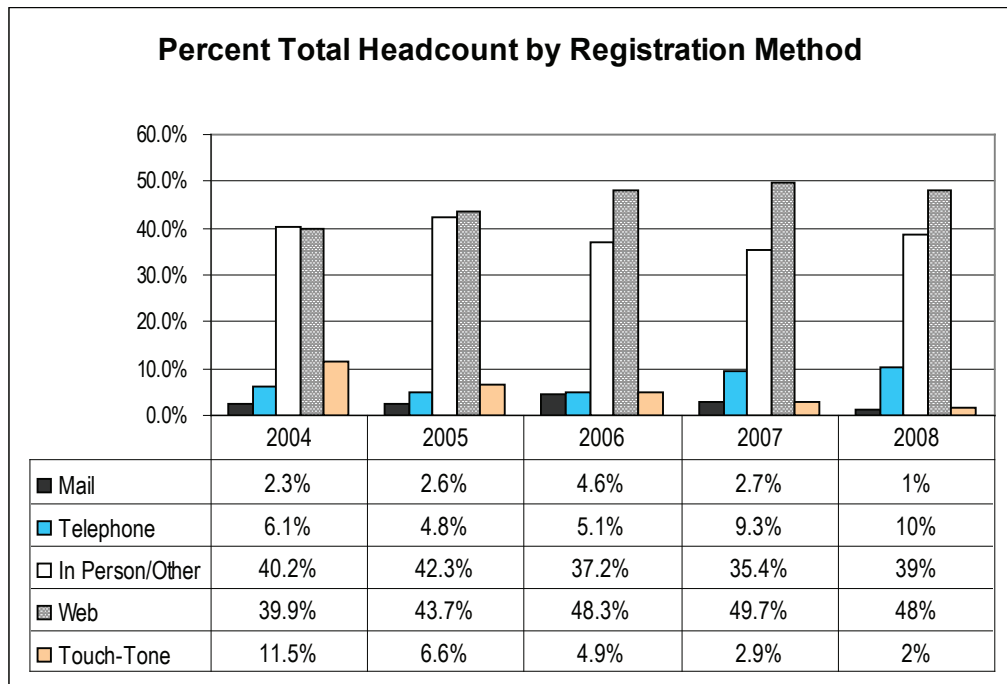
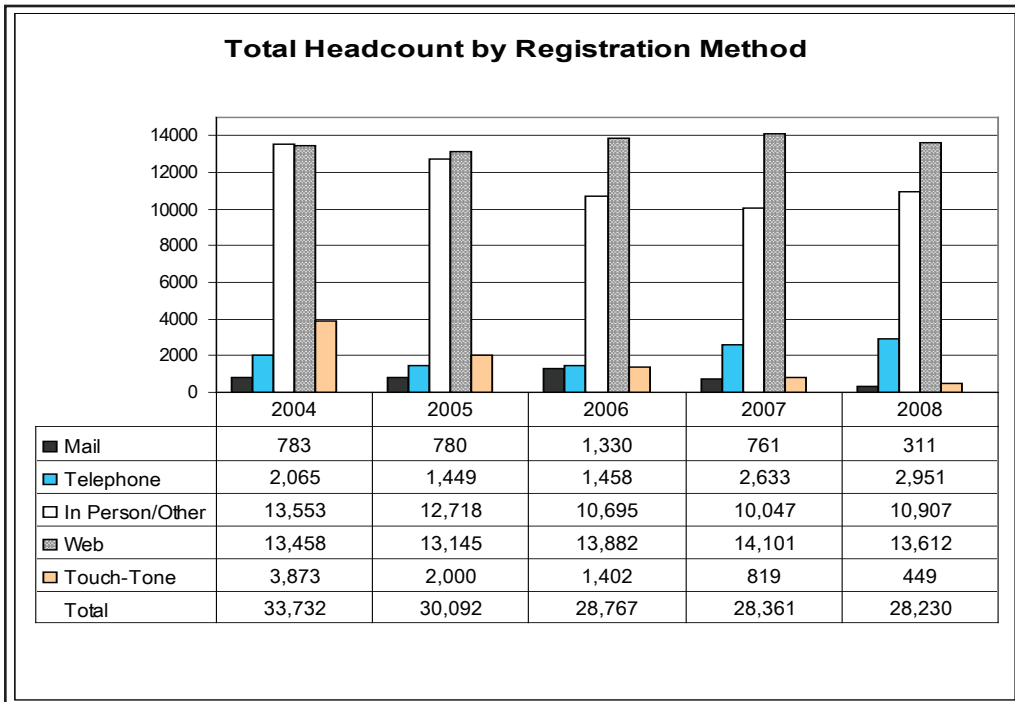


Total Headcount by Ethnicity

According to ESRI Business Analyst Online (<http://bao.esri.com/>), ethnic diversity is increasing in DuPage County. The Black population from 2000 to 2008 remained stable, the Hispanic population increased from 9% to 11.7% and the Asian population increased from 7.9% to 10.2%. The white population dropped from 84% to 80.1% during this time frame. Similarly, the proportion of Black students at College of DuPage has increased from 2004 to 2008 by 1%, and the proportion of Hispanic students has increased 3%. The proportion of white students has decreased 6% and the proportion of Asian students is unchanged.



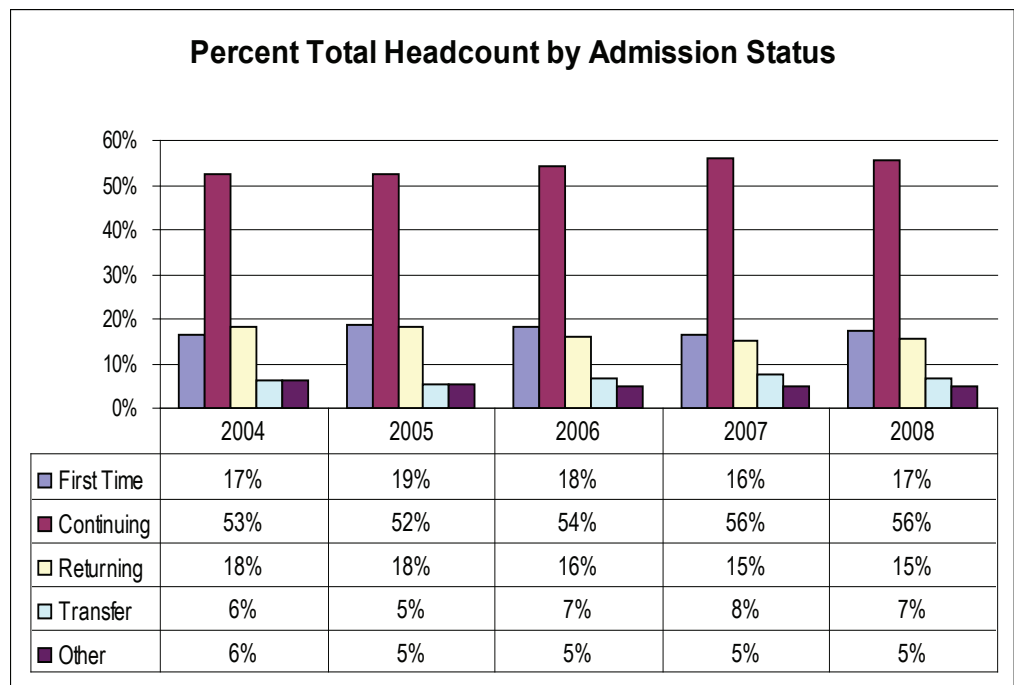
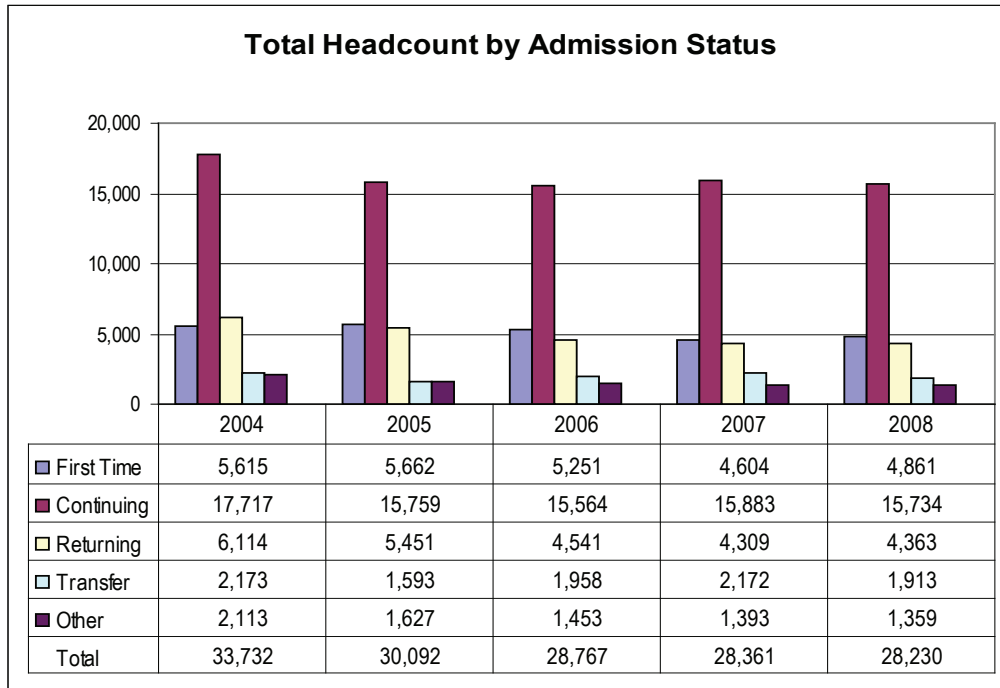
Total Headcount by Registration Method



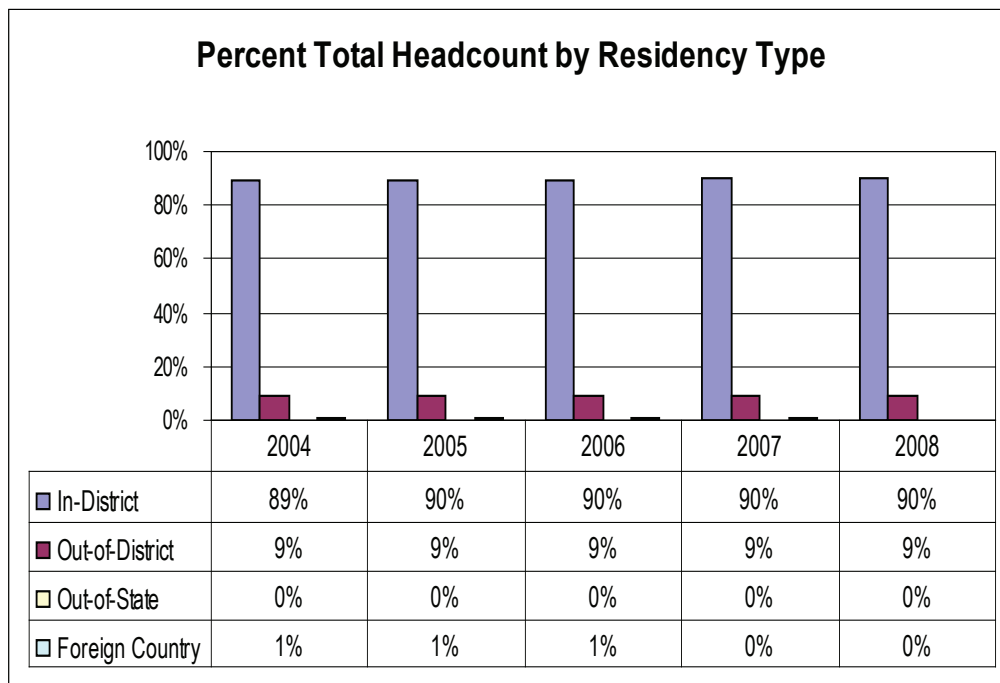
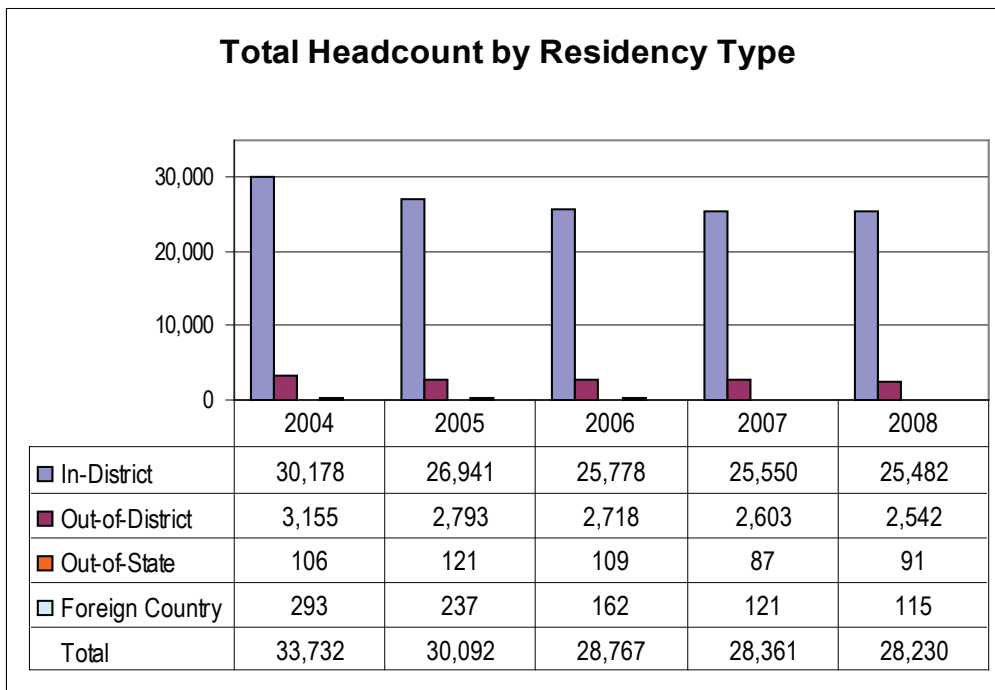
Total Headcount by Registration Method

Total Headcount by Residency Type

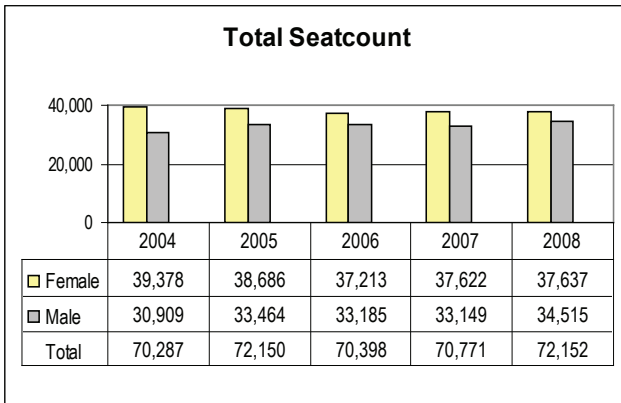

Total Seatcount and Non-Credit Seatcount by Gender

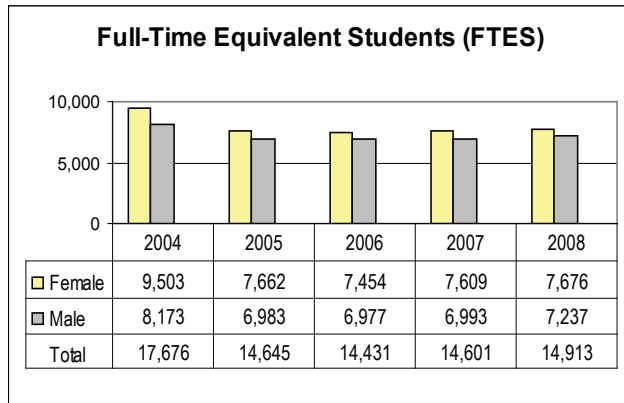


Total Seatcount and Non-Credit Seatcount by Gender

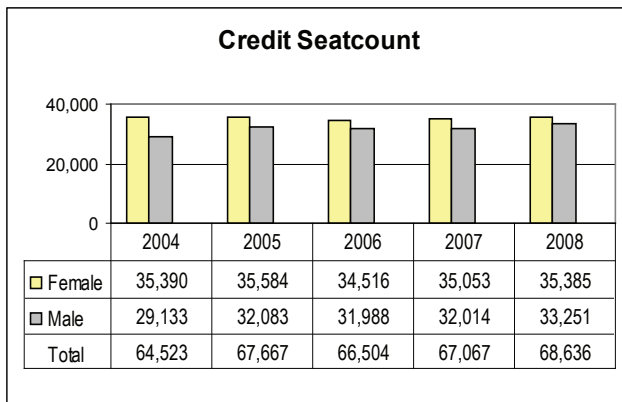
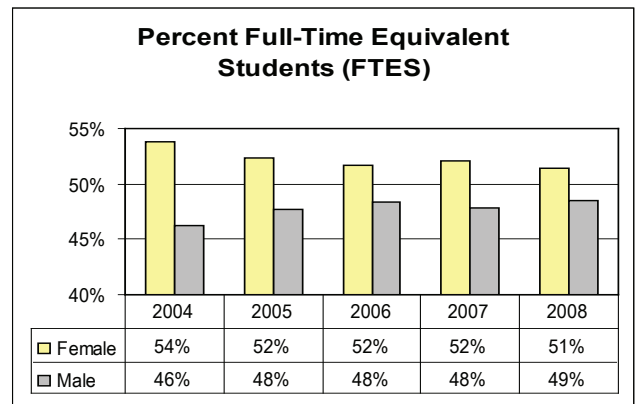


Full-Time Equivalent Students (FTES) and Credit Seatcount by Gender



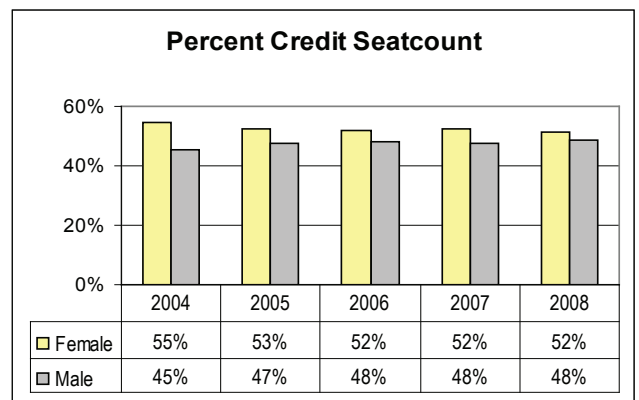
Full Time Equivalent Students (FTES) by Gender

Overall FTES (credit hours divided by 15) had decreased but appears to have stabilized. Manles and femails now generate nearly equal FTES

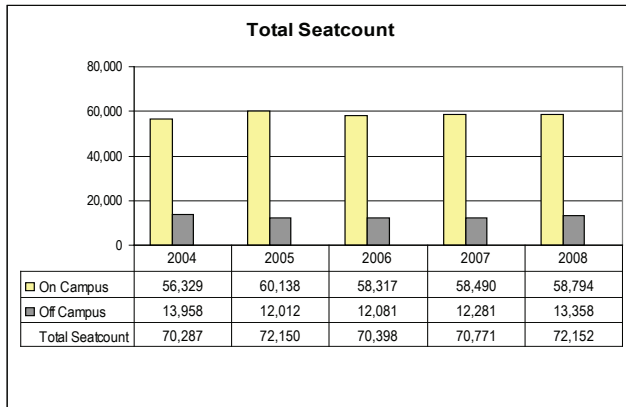


Credit Seatcount by Gender

The number of credit seats occupied by male students has risen since 2004 while the number of credit seats occupied by females has remained the same.

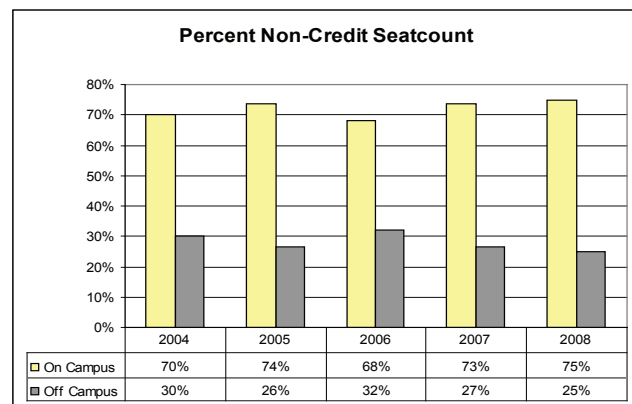
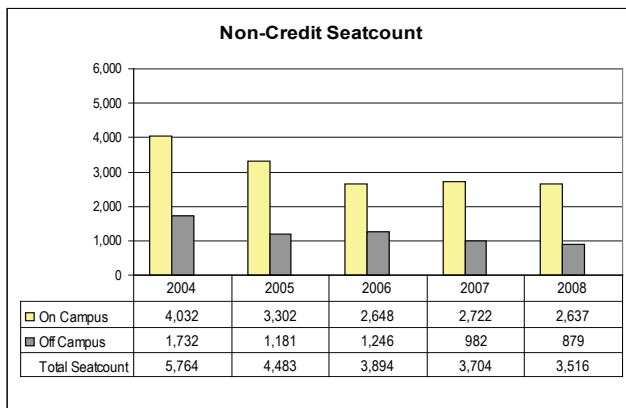
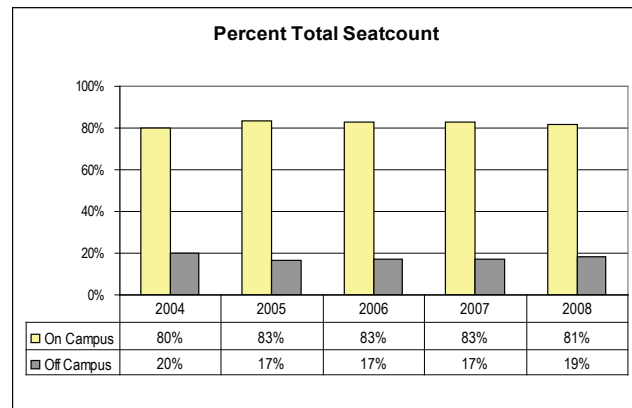


Total Seatcount and Non-Credit Seatcount by Meeting Location

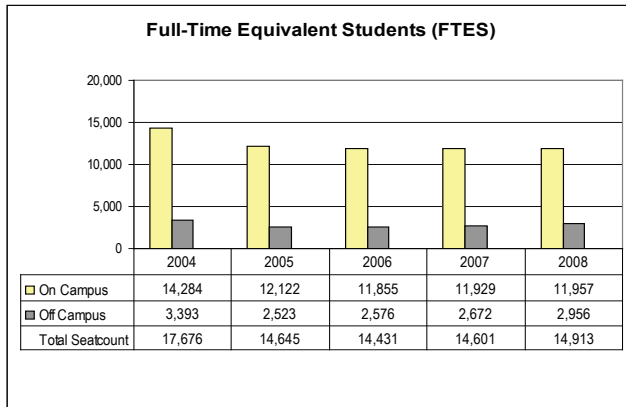


Total Seatcount and Non-Credit Seatcount by Meeting Location

A larger percentage of credit (approximately 80%) than non-credit (approximately 70%) seats are on campus.

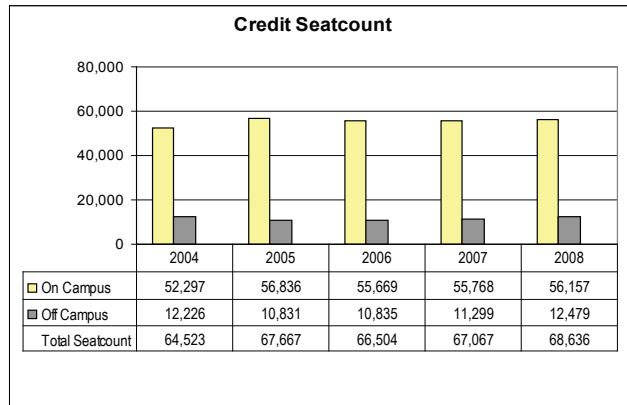
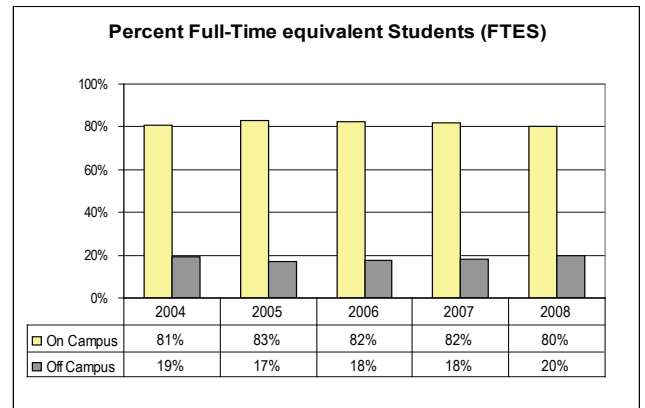


Full-Time Equivalent Students (FTES) and Credit Seatcount by Meeting Location



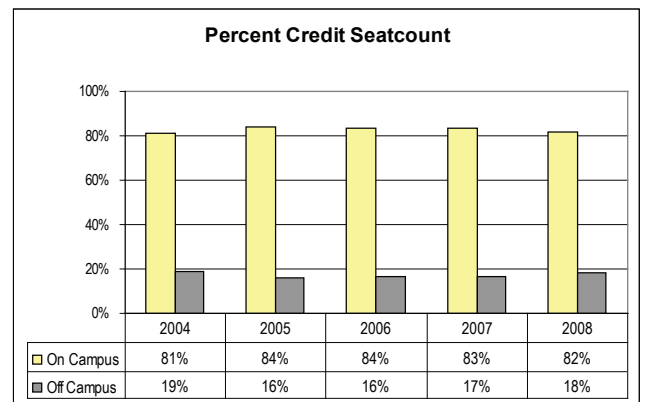

On-campus FTES have stabilized in 2008.

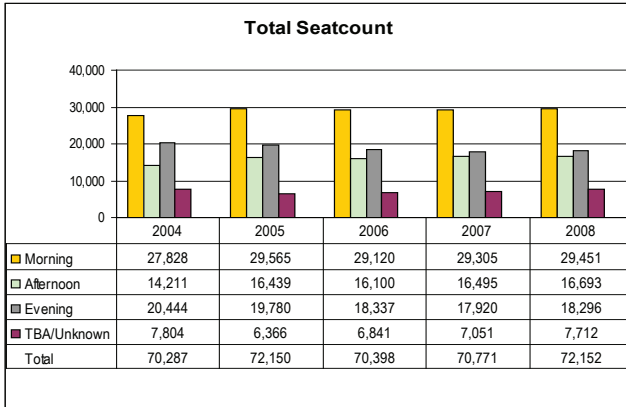


Credit Seatcount by Meeting Location

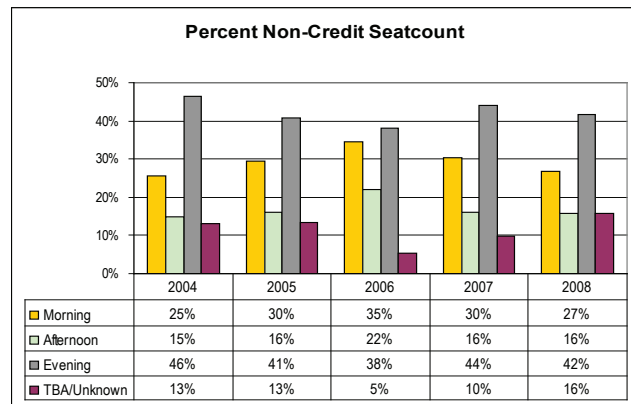
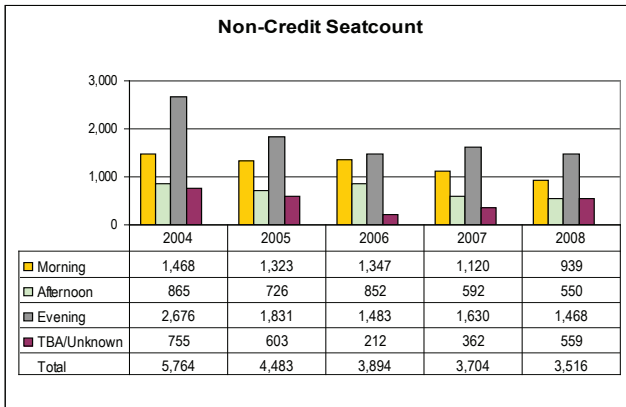
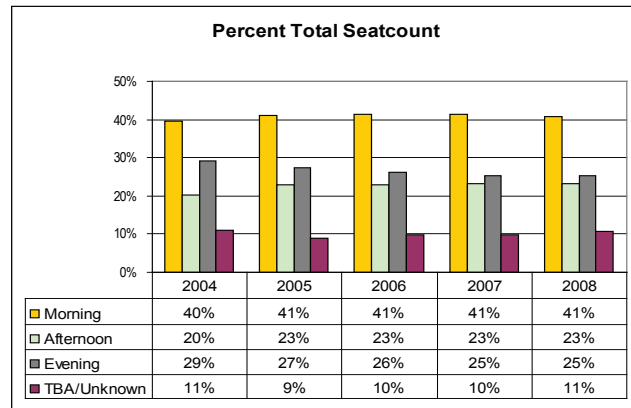

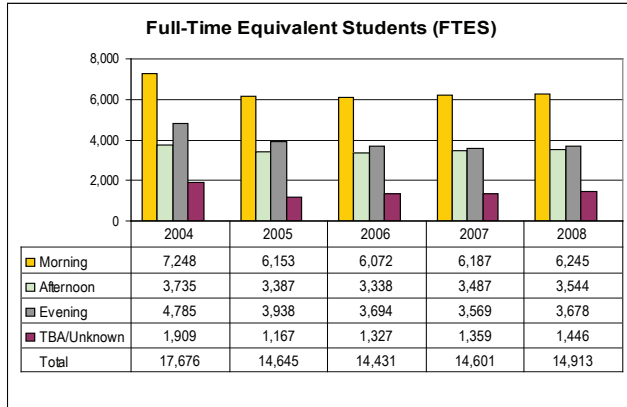
Total Seatcount and Non-Credit Seatcount by Meeting Time

 Non-credit seatcount is more frequent during the evening. However, in 2008 27% of non-credit seats were occupied during the morning.

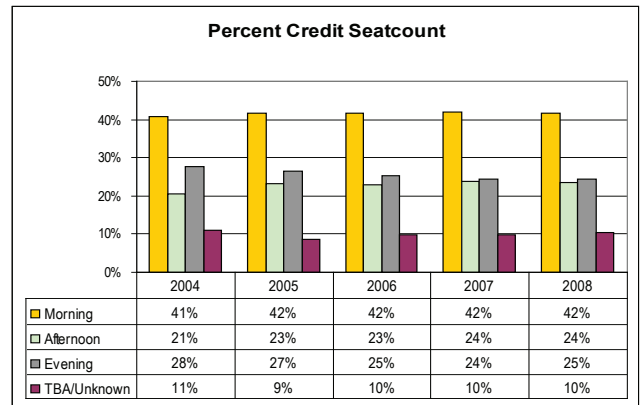
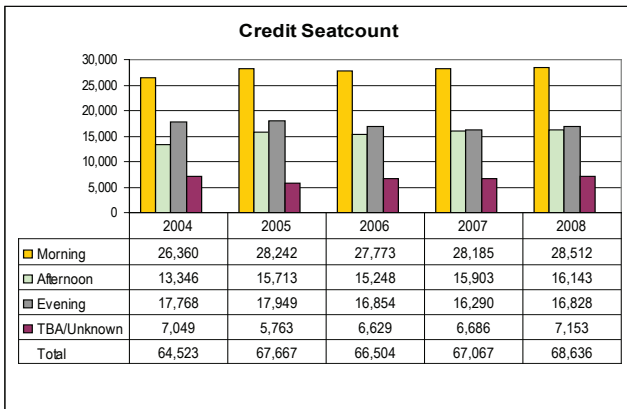
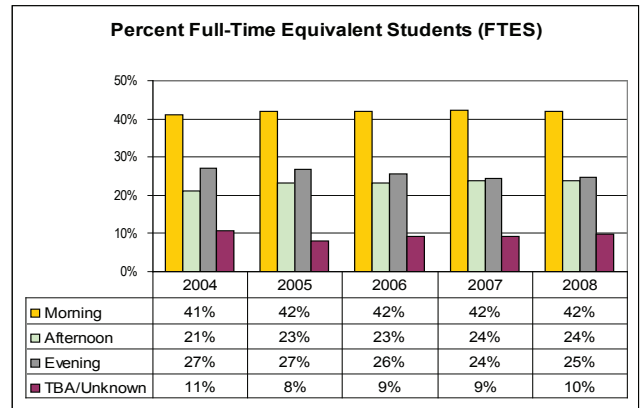


Full-Time Equivalent Students (FTES) and Credit Seatcount by Meeting Time

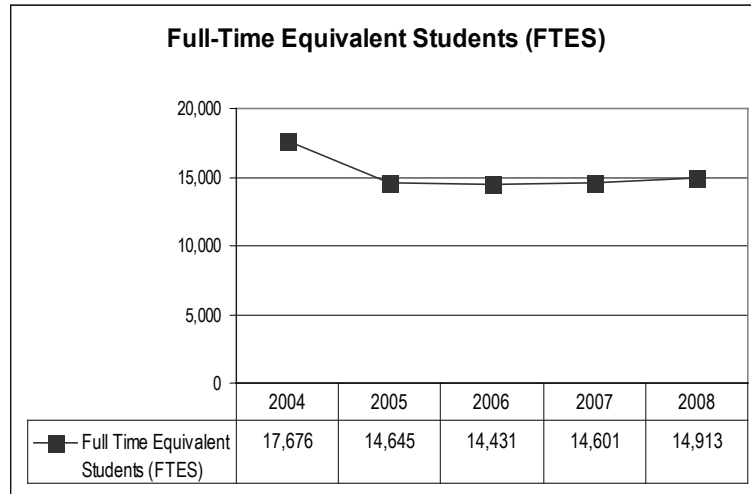
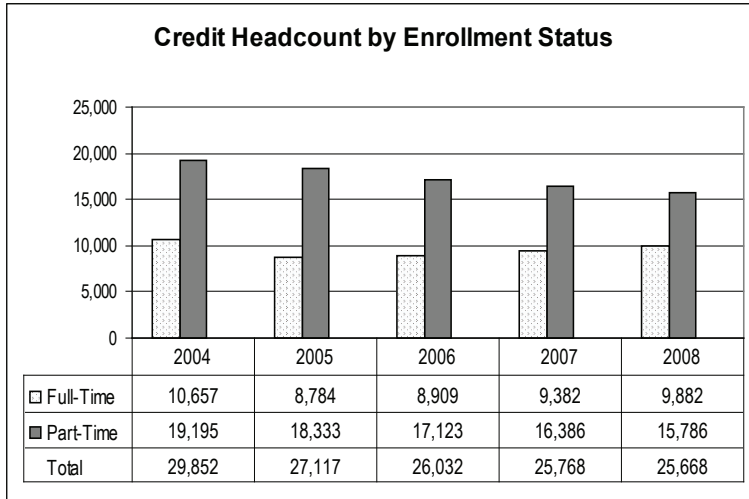

Approximately two-thirds of credit students attend part-time.

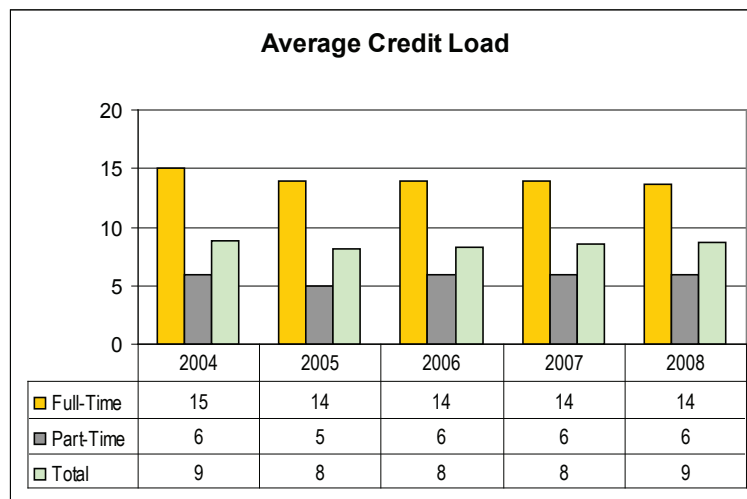
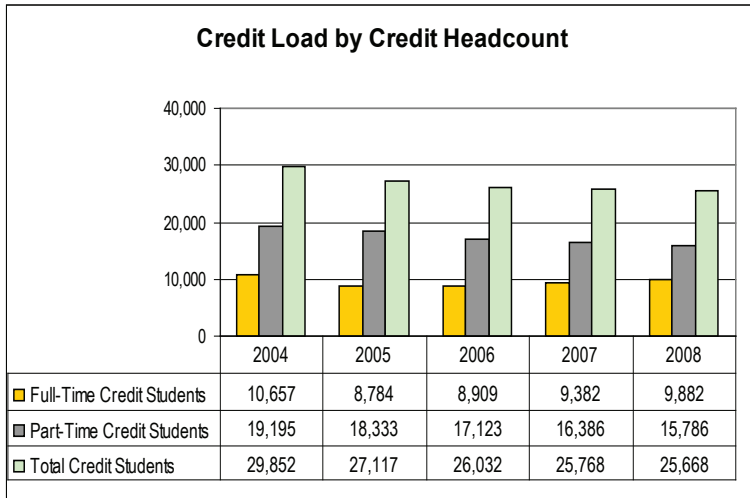
Although FTE dropped from 2004 to 2005, the number of credit hours has remained stable over the last four years.

The gap in credit headcount in gender decreased by 2% from 2004 to 2005 and has remained the same since 2005.

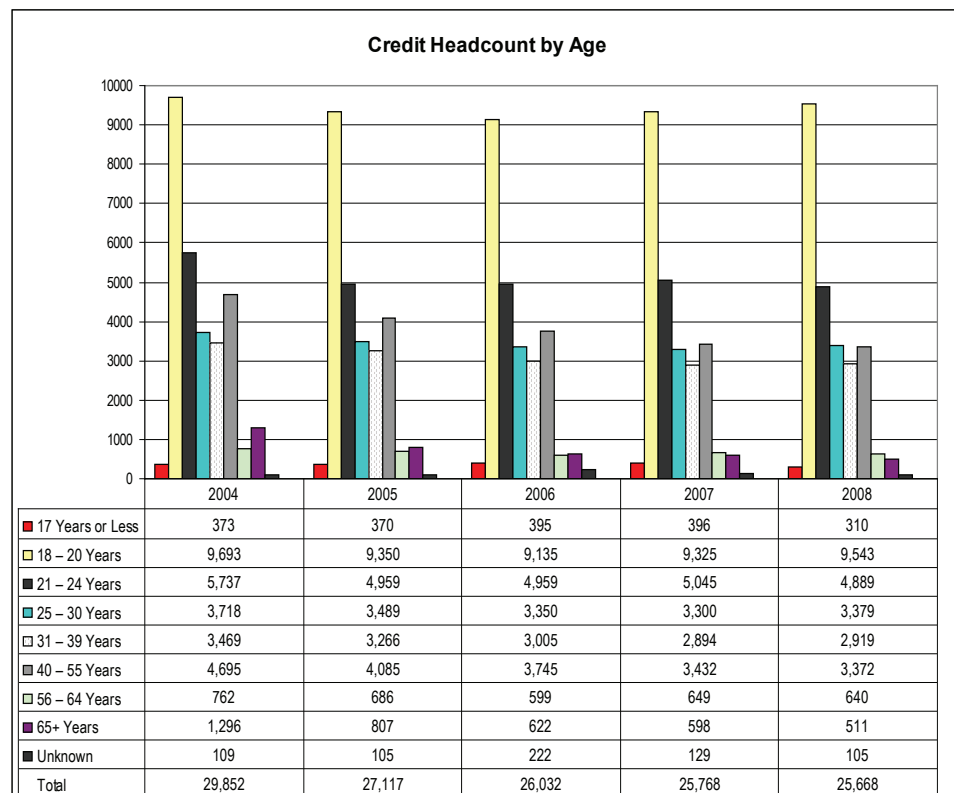


Credit Headcount by Age

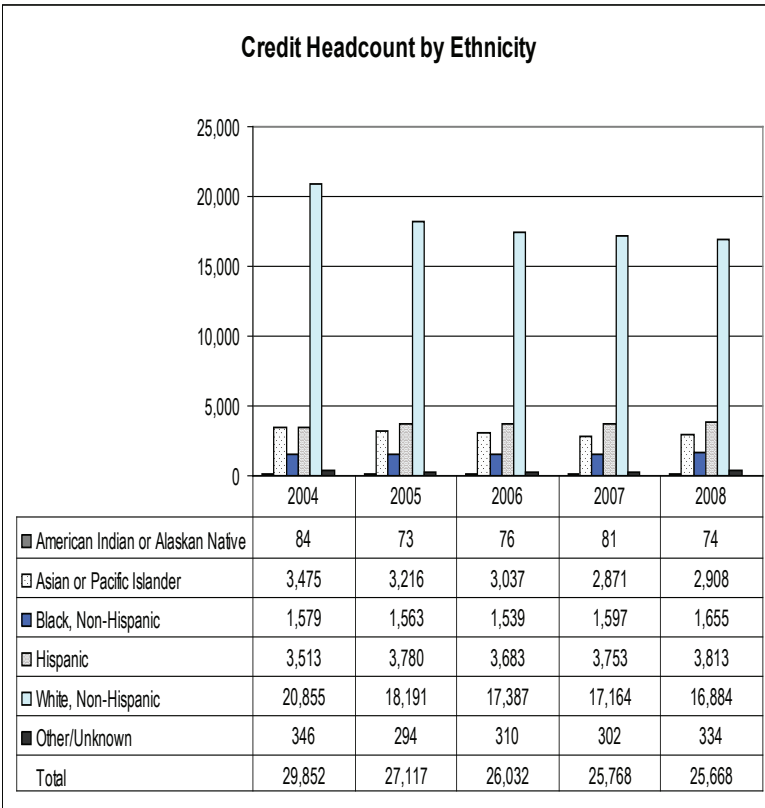

Credit students are predominantly 18 to 24 years old. The relative number of credit students by age range is unchanged over the last five years.

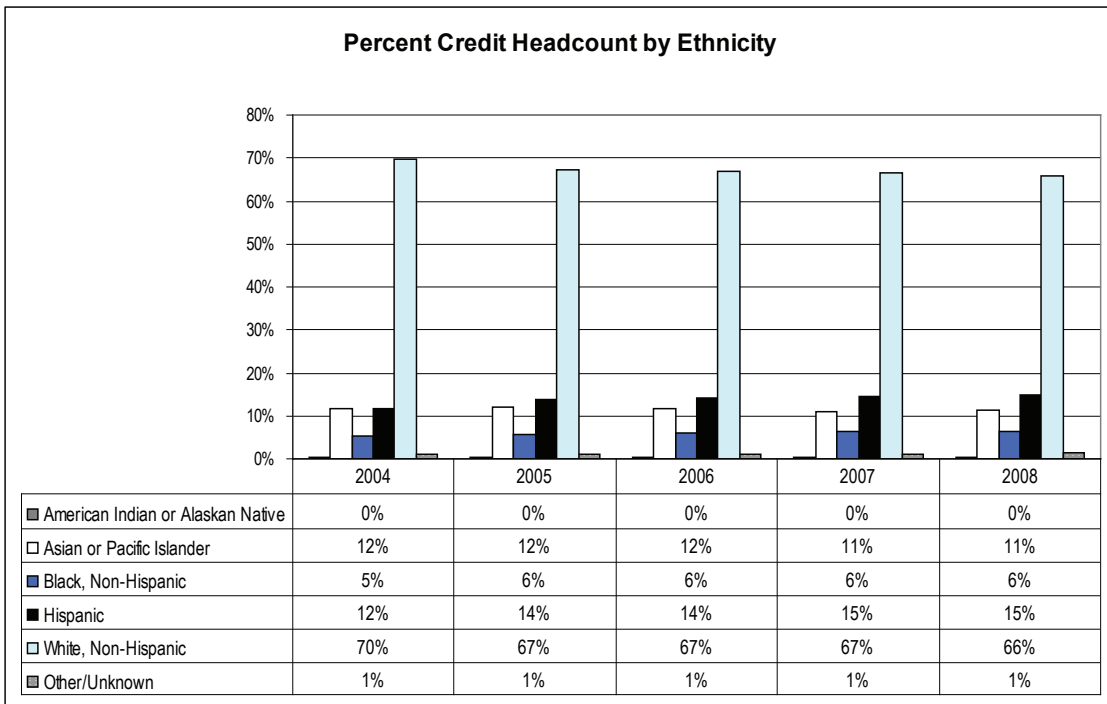


Credit Headcount by Ethnicity

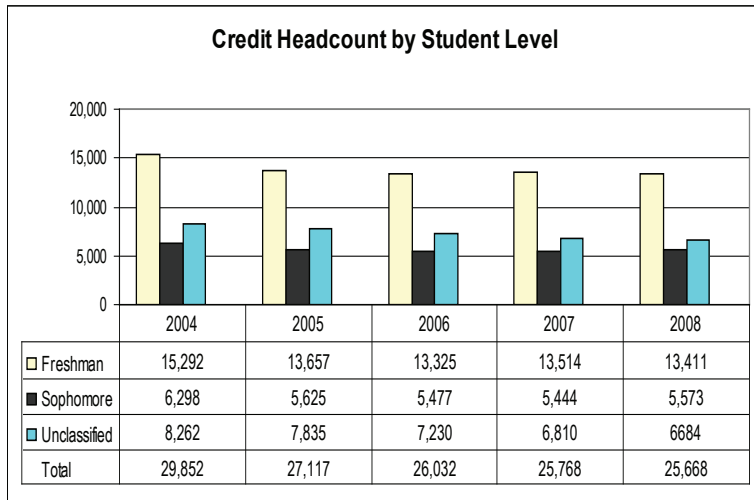

Credit headcount ethnicity profiles are similar to total headcount ethnicity profiles.

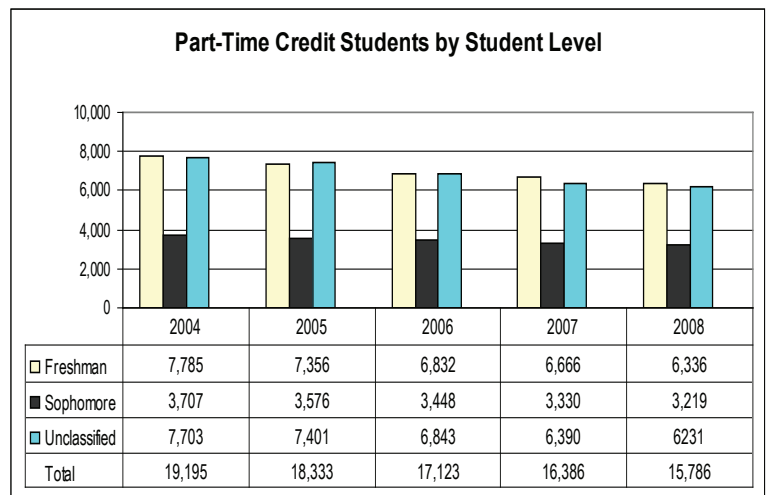
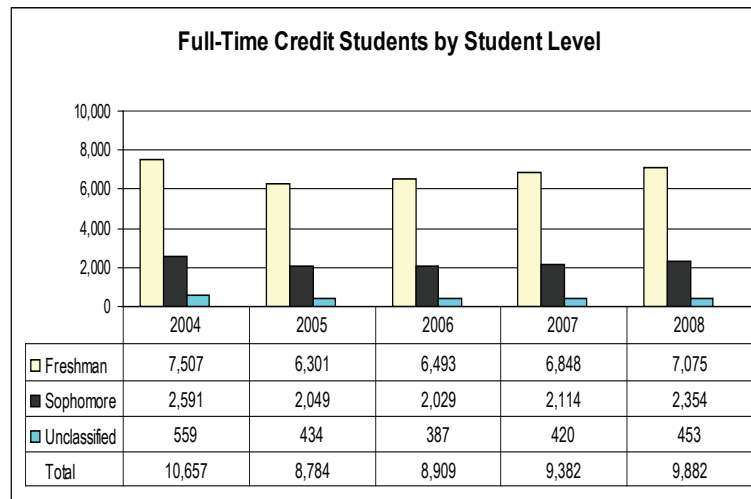


Credit Headcount by Student Level

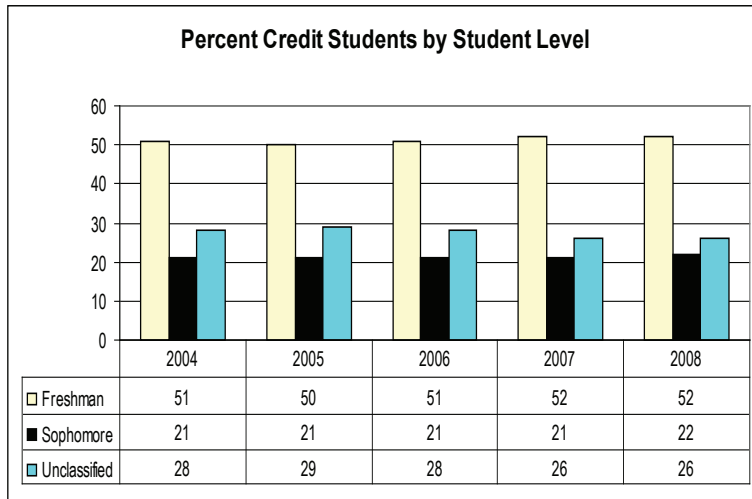

Part-time students are more likely to be unclassified than full-time students. 93% of unclassified students attend part-time.

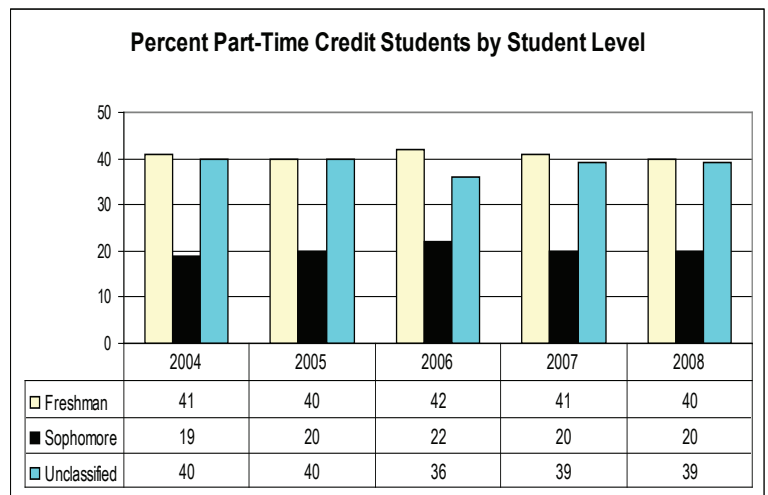
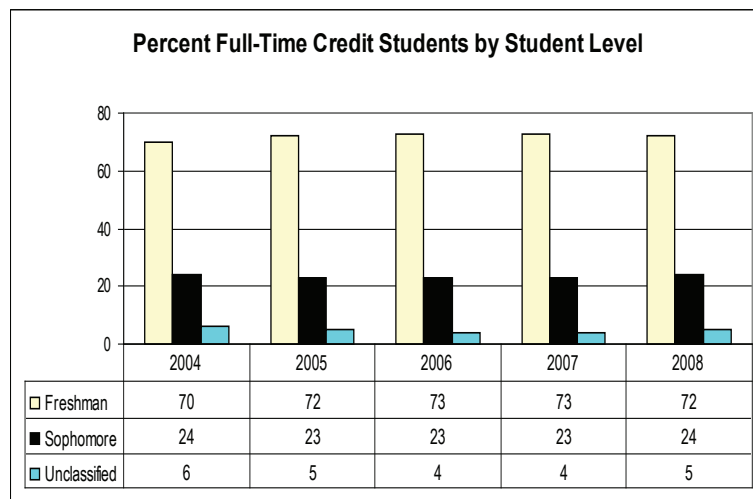


Percent Credit Headcount by Student Level

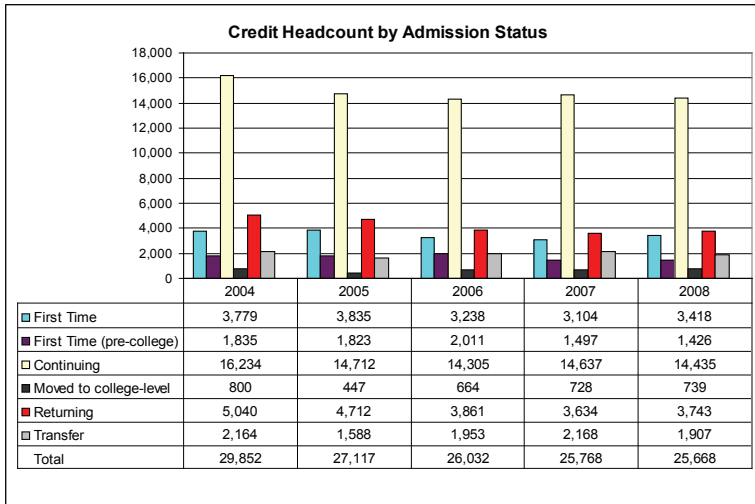


Percent Credit Headcount by Student Level

The proportion of freshmen, sophomore and unclassified students has remained stable over the previous five years.

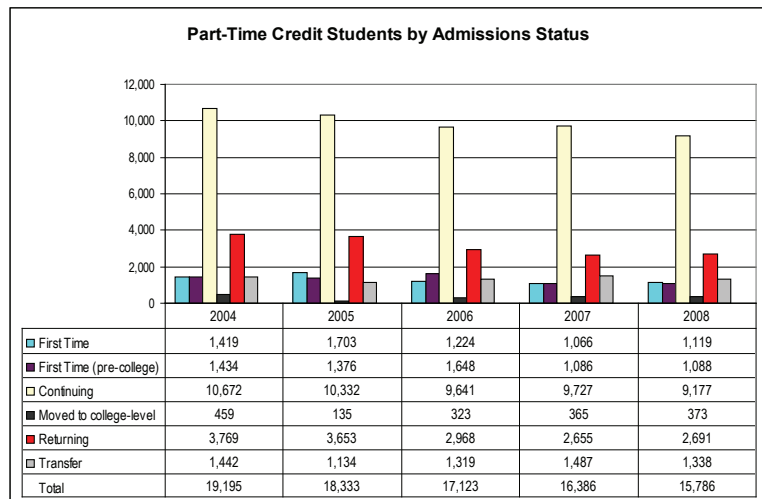
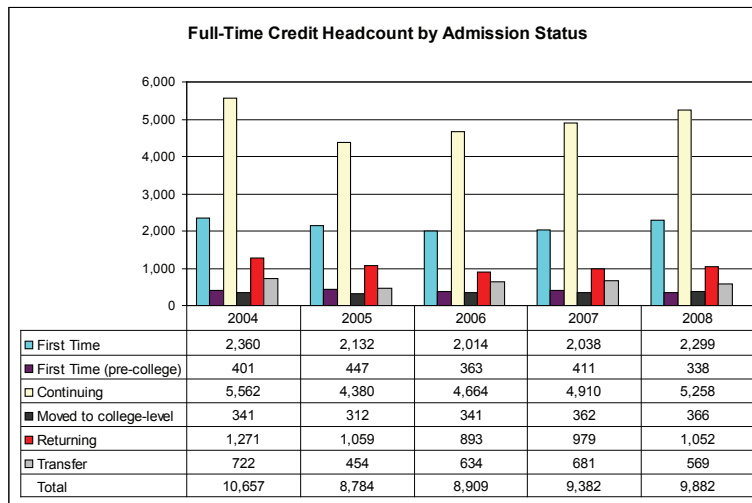

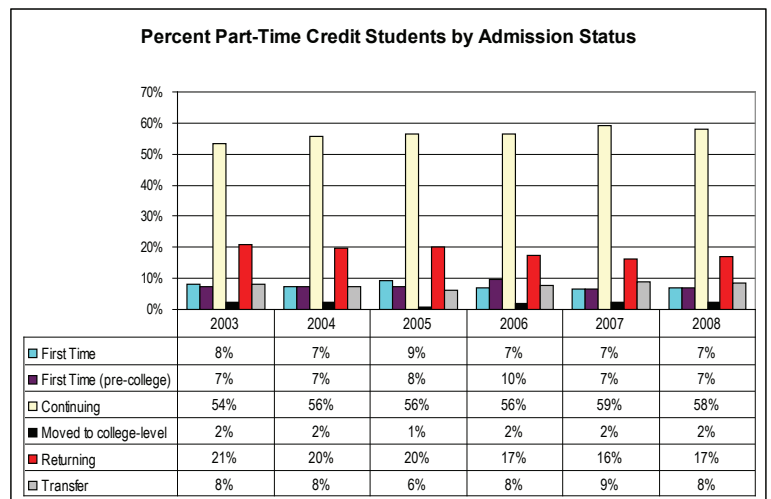
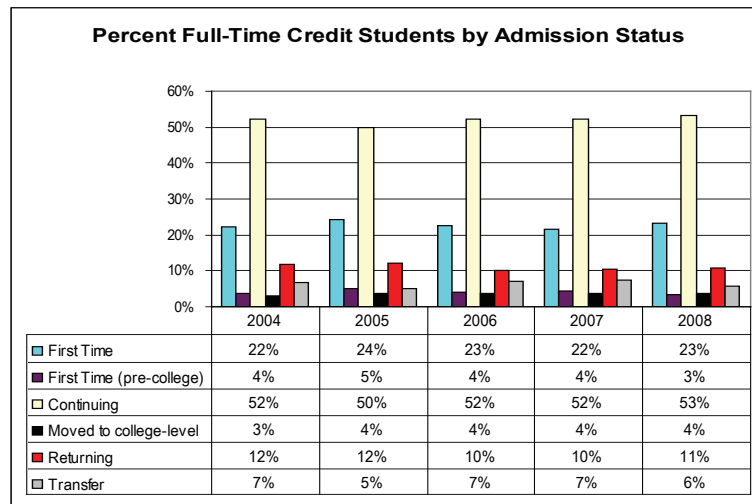
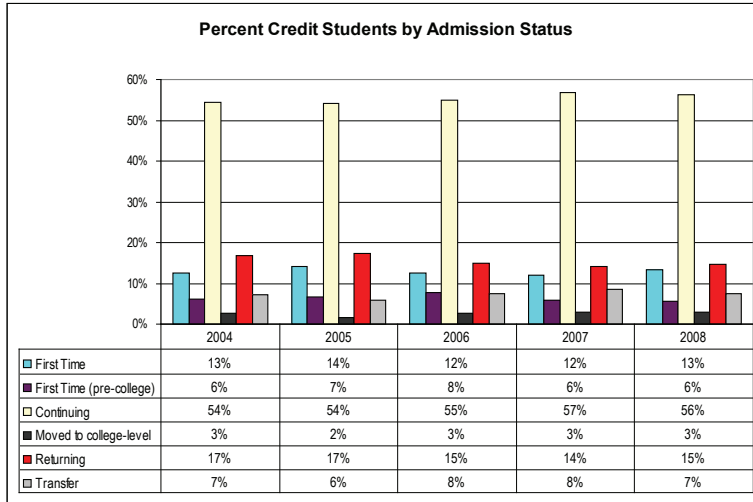


Credit Headcount by Admission Status and Percent Credit Headcount by Admission Status

The admission status for over half of students is as continuing students.



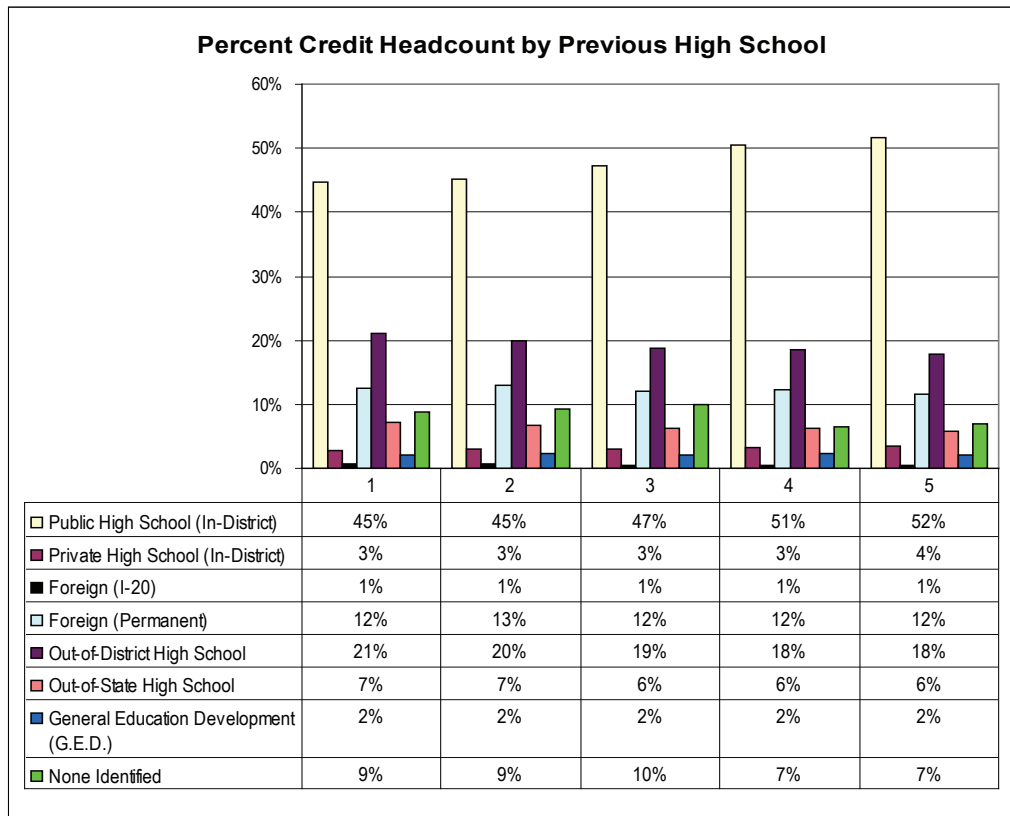
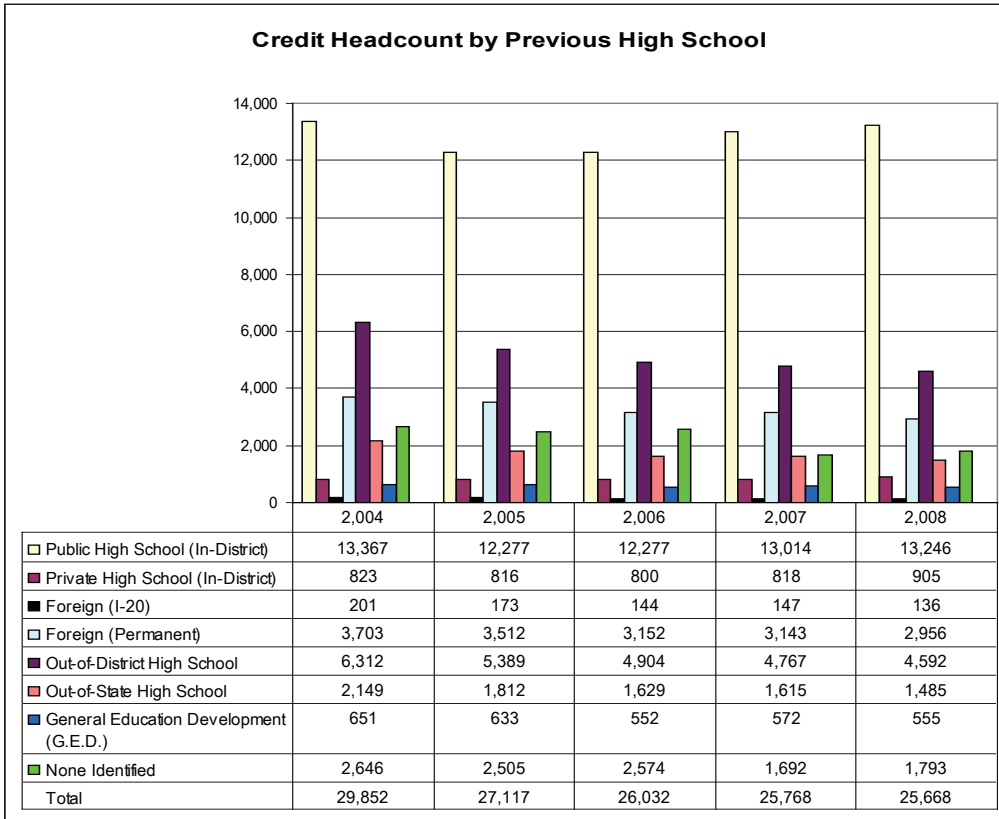
Percent Credit Headcount by Admission Status



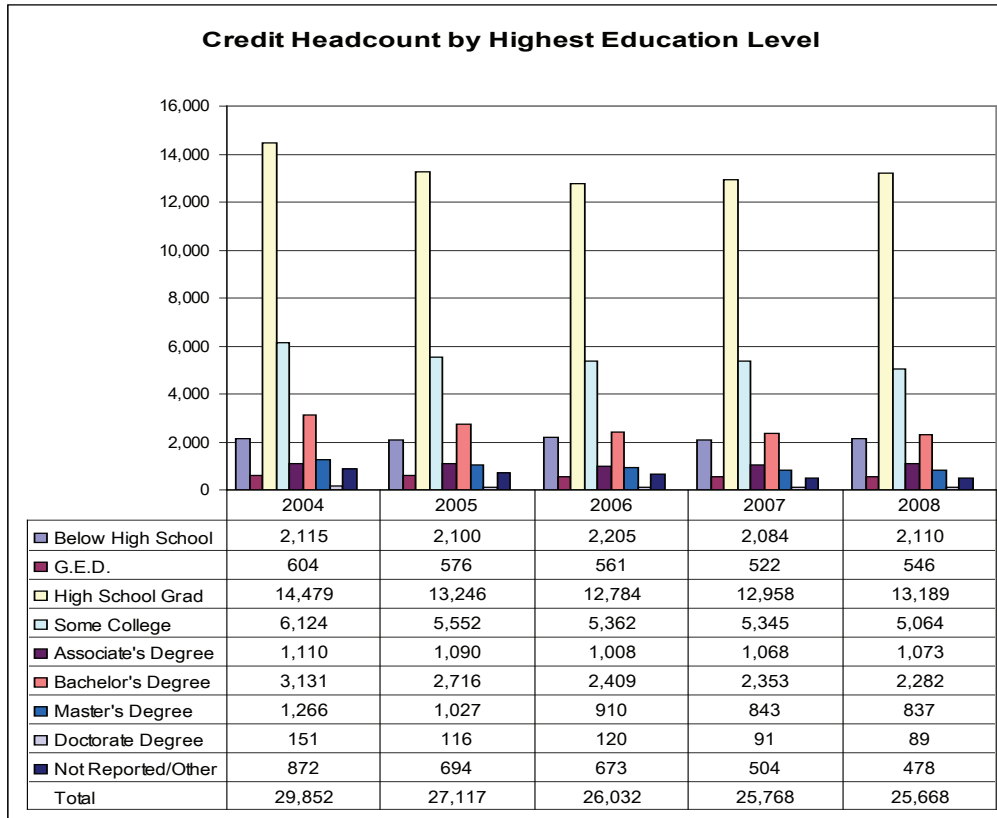

The percentage of students who attended public in-district high schools has increased by 7% over the previous five year period.

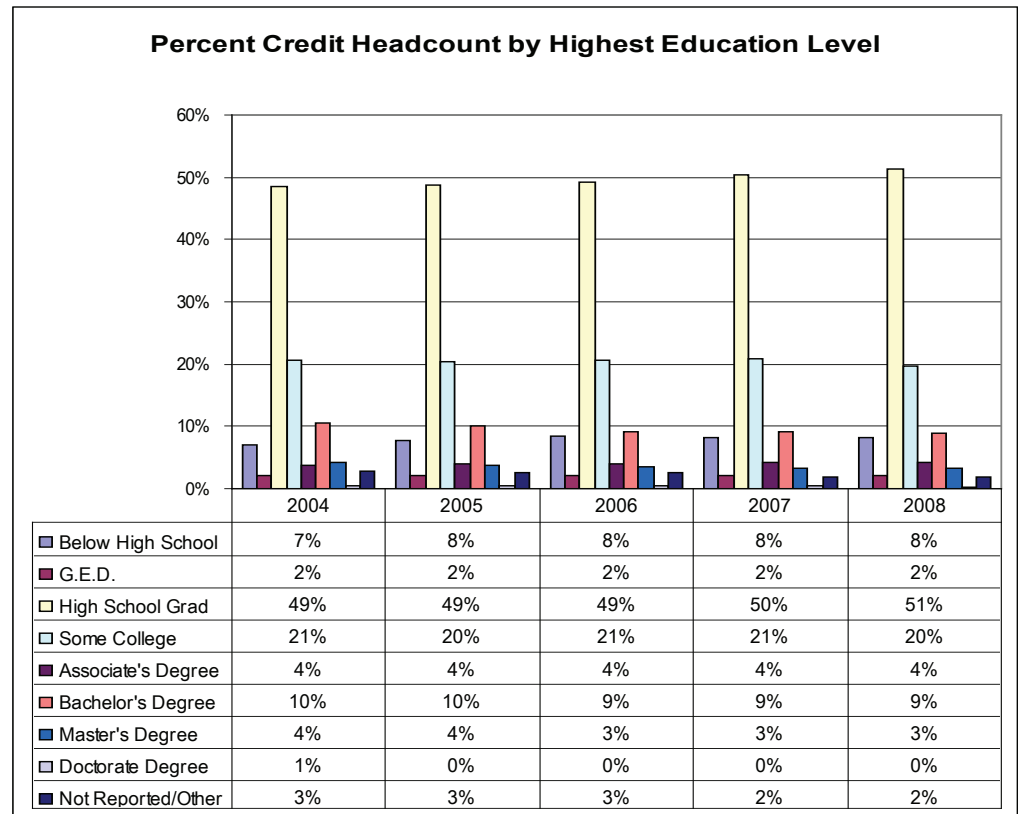


Credit Headcount by Highest Education Level

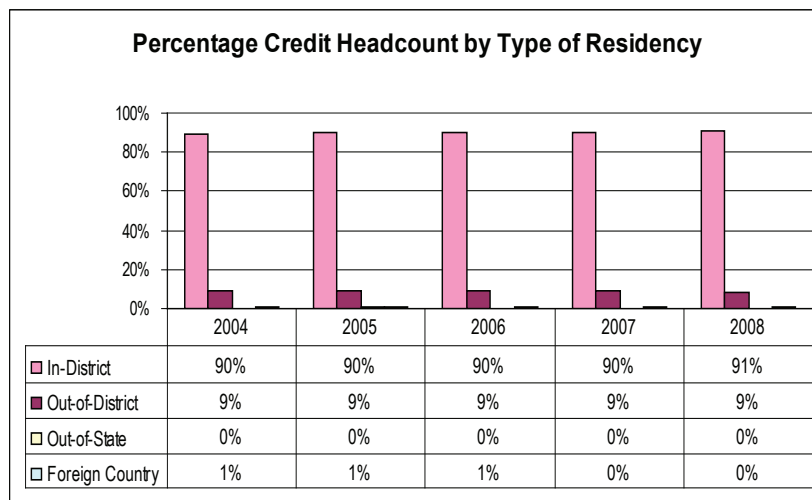
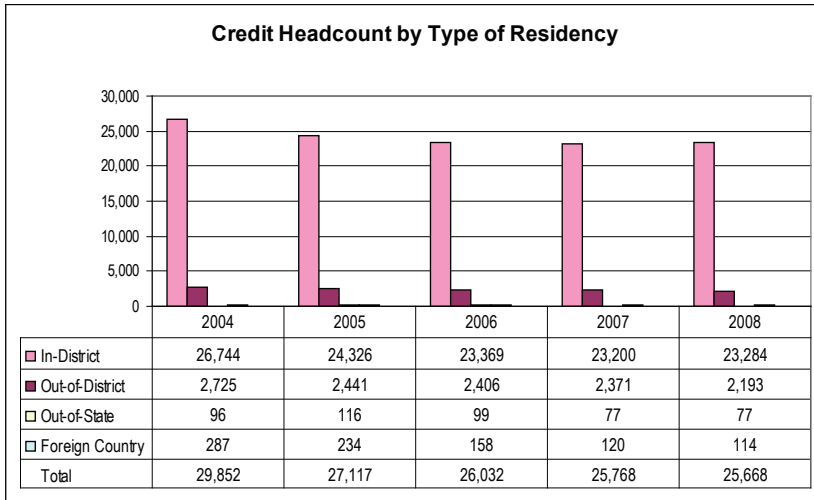


Credit Headcount by Highest Educational Level

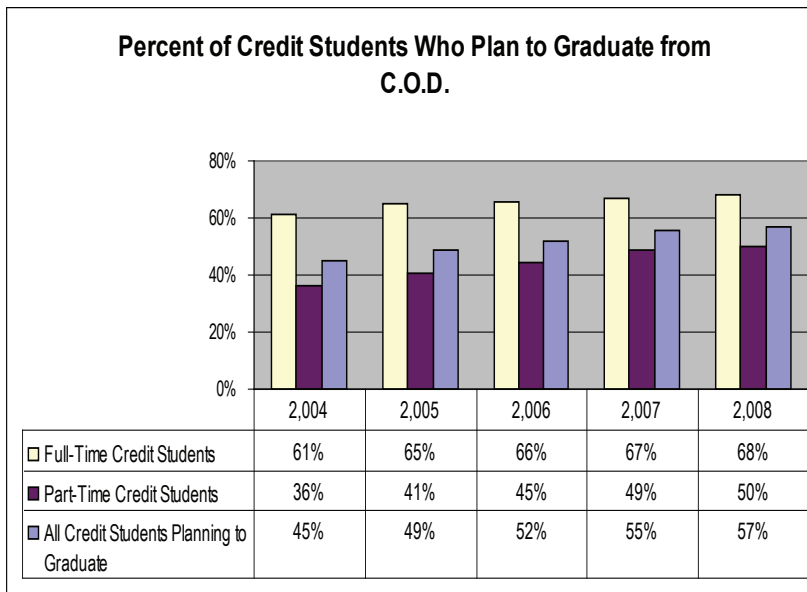
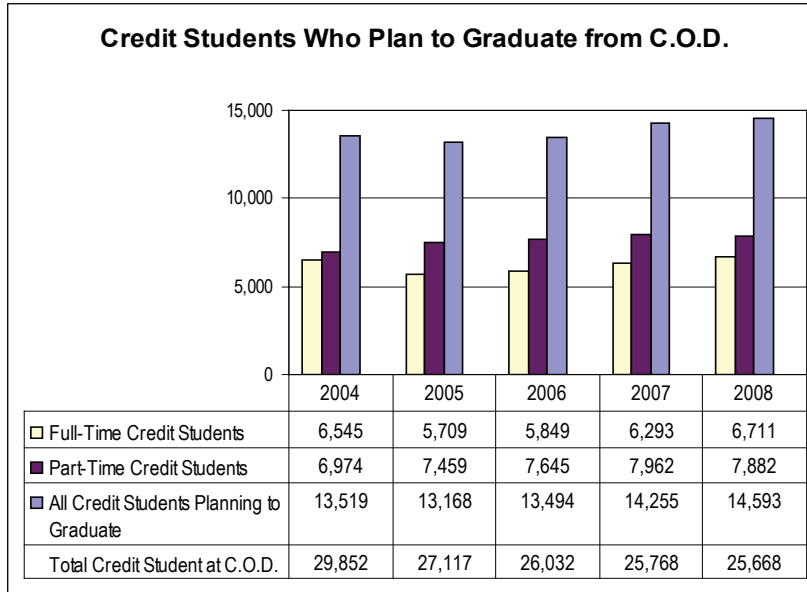
Credit Headcount by Registration Method

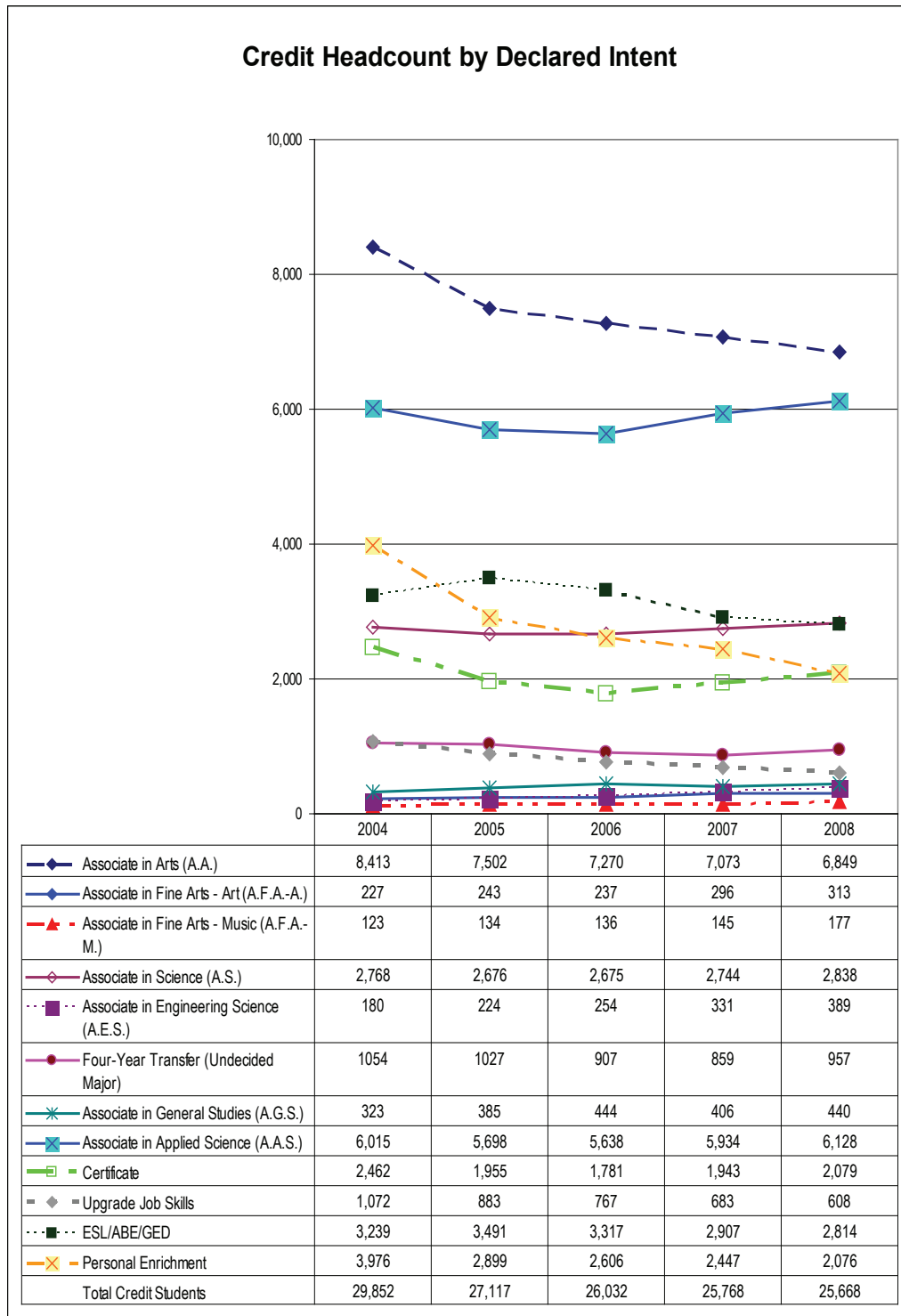

The percent of credit students planning to graduate from College of DuPage is increasing especially among part-time students.

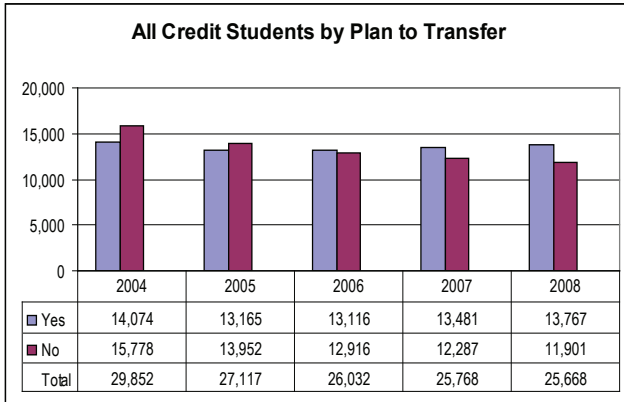
Percent Credit Headcount by Declared Intent

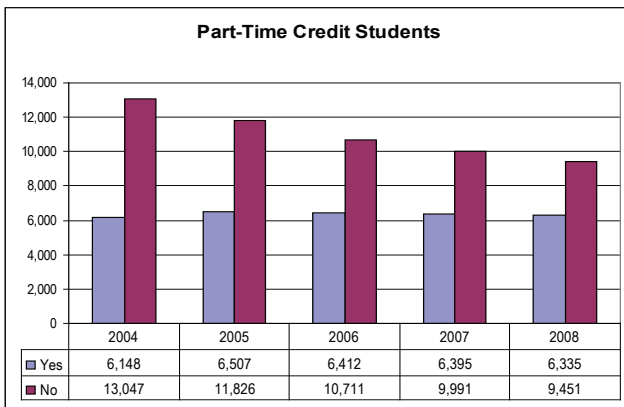
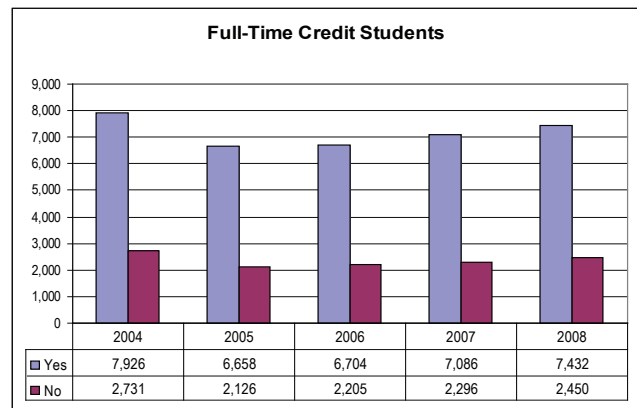
Despite declining enrollment overall, the number of credit students declaring an interest in pursuing an Associate in Applied Science has increased.

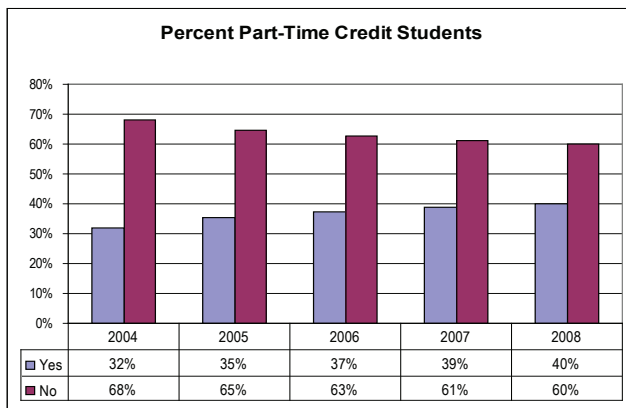
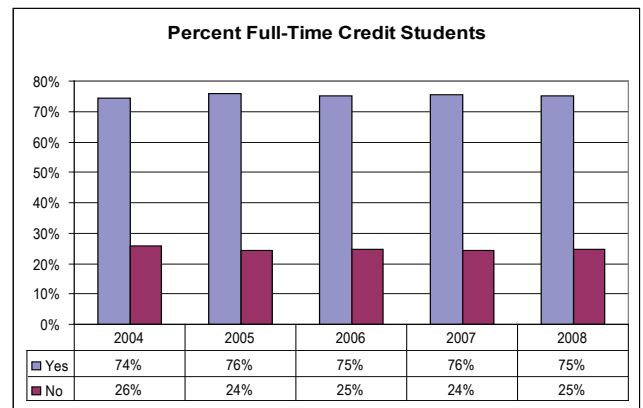
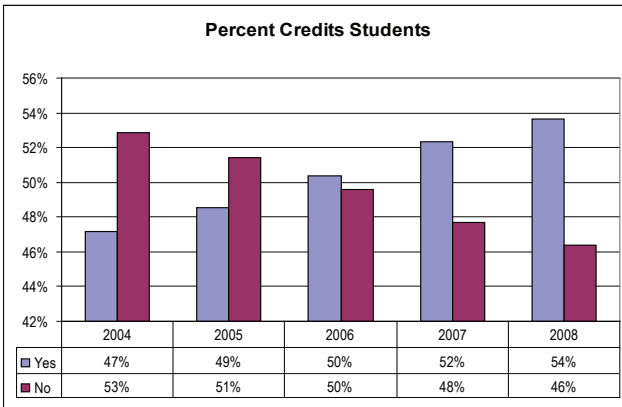


Credit Headcount by Plan to Transfer
