**FACULTY AND STAFF NEWS**



**Chris Goergen**, Prof. of Political Science, and three COD students attended a televised satellite town hall meeting featuring **Kofi Annan**, Secretary Gen. of the U.N. The meeting was moderated by **Walter Cronkite** and WTTW's senior editor, **John D. Calloway**.

**Bernie Fradkin** attended a GATE conference in Costa Rica. GATE is the GLOBAL ALLIANCE FOR TRANSNATIONAL EDUCATION, founded in 1995, and is an alliance of businesses, educators, quality assurance agencies, governments, and intergovernmental organizations concerned with quality issues in transnational education. COD was in the limelight, as Bernie led a panel discussion about transnational library services. The session was attended by representatives of 22 countries. The College of DuPage may well want to explore global growth opportunities and the GATE certification process for courses and programs. The unbridled growth of instruction overseas begs the question of quality and control, i.e. who is certifying the quality of what is exported to other nations?

**Evelyn Hopkins**, the new Dean for Continuing Education, has had a variety of international experiences. During her junior year in college, she lived in Salzburg, Austria for a semester with an older Austrian couple and studied German, along with drawing and art history. She traveled on a steamer along the coast of Yugoslavia, visited Greece by rail and boat, Budapest, France, Germany, and Italy.

She also traveled with her mother to Europe, as well as other destinations around the world including Australia, New Zealand, Fiji, Barbados, British Virgin Islands, and India.

As the Liberal Arts Continuing Education Coordinator at Harper College, Evelyn was responsible for the adult language program that included transla-

tion, one-on-one tutoring, interpreting, distance education, as well as more traditional classroom instruction. She created and was responsible for the Children's Language Academy. The program offered language classes at individual schools that met before and after school for grades K-6. She developed and coordinated *Learning Voyages*, a program of national and international faculty-led tours. Through this program, she took a group of 26 people to the south of France and Paris. Evelyn is looking forward to working with other departments to incorporate international topics and global issues into future Continuing Education programming.

**Carol Riphenburg**, Professor of Political Science, writes: "Thanks for all in the college family who were concerned about my arrival in the nick of time-for the beginning of fall classes at COD. It was interesting to witness the reaction to the September 11 tragedy from a vantage point outside the US in Zanzibar. Those in the tourist business are sympathetic to Americans in that their livelihood depends, to some degree, on them. It was reported, however, that some cheered on seeing and hearing that the number one superpower was brought low. I feel free to mention this, since I work on a college campus which supports and encourages the free and full exchange of ideas and opinions. I think many Americans don't understand the resentment and bad opinion many people in the Middle East and developing world have toward the U.S.. This this is a major part of the "war" challenge we currently face.

While in Tanzania I visited some of the more remote game parks and reserves in Tanzania. A couple of nights, my son and I were the only guests at a tented camp on the Rufiji River. I've never seen so many crocodiles before and the birds were wonderful. Another highlight was visiting Engaruka, an archaeological site. We drove along the bottom, eastern edge



of the Rift Valley, losing the road on occasion, viewing mini-sand storms (like small tornadoes) on the way, engulfed occasionally in a talcum powder-like dust bath as our landrover traversed a sand river. The Maasai were dressed in their red robes and beaded earrings, away from the well-traveled tourist areas and where poverty also abounds. The roads in Tanzania, outside of those close to a few urban areas, are rugged and forbidding. I'm not joining the special forces to go to Afghanistan any time soon. Anyway, I do get to talk to students about why wearing the *hejab* isn't the only thing that counts."

**Misty Sheehan**, Associate Prof. of Humanities, was invited to attend a seminar at the East West Center in Honolulu entitled *Teaching about China and the U.S.* Seven faculty from the US and 17 from China attended. **Roger Ames**, Prof. of Philosophy, summarized the purpose of the seminar, "If we want to solve the problems in the world, they are not solved by legislation or institutions, but by changing attitudes, one-on-one. The media promotes an unfair and uninformed perception (of relations between China and the U.S.), therefore this institute is to take educators, bring them together, and promote an intimate relationship amongst them."

**Juet Brown** is a Fulbright Scholar from Zimbabwe on a yearlong stay at COD. At Hillside Teachers College in Bulawayo, Juet is a biologist who specializes in genetics, plant pathology, environmental and industrial microbiology, and integrated science. At COD she will sit in on classes, visit and speak in classes, and make presentations at other colleges. In Winter Quarter she will teach her own section of Biology 100. ## TEACH-IN ON TERRORISM

In response to the horrific events on **Sept. 11**, the college held a *Teach-In on Terrorism* in the MAC Main Stage. Over 1200 students, staff, and community members turned out to listen to COD faculty, students, and invited guests share their expertise and insights

about the causes and effects of the September 11 attacks. After the grief and shock subsided, there was a widely shared and deeply felt need to deal with the attacks at a more intellectual level, to try to understand, in some depth, the issues facing the U.S. as a nation and as a global partner in the world. Accordingly, **Joel Quam, Carol Rippenburg, Chuck Ellenbaum, Franz Burnier, Chris Picard, Mark Fazzini, and John Woods** from the University of Chicago made presentations on Islam, the nature and genesis of terrorism, geography, politics, and cultures. The event was moderated by **Tammie Bob** and coordinated by **Zinta Konrad**.

### SADIE FLUCAS IN NIGERIA

**Sadie Flucas**, Associate Dean, Community Education and Development, and Director of the College's Public Policy Institute, served as the lead resource person for the first ever Public Issues Forum Workshop in Nigeria. The one week workshop was held in Akure, Ondo State, Nigeria, and used the National Issues Forum model of deliberation on issues of public policy. The workshop, sponsored by the Ondo State Teaching Service Commission in collaboration with the College of DuPage and the Kettering Foundation, was attended by a total of 34 participants, mostly high school principals, from the local governments throughout Ondo State. Retired Federal University of Technology Vice-Chancellor, **Dr. A.A. Ilemobade**, and the Executive Director of the Daily Times of Nigeria based in Lagos, **Mr. Edwin Baiye**, served as co-facilitators with Flucas.

The workshop was officially opened on behalf of the Governor of the State by his Deputy, **Barrister Afolabi Iyantán**, and attended by top state government officials, including the Chairman of the Teaching Service Commission and newly appointed Permanent Secretaries for Schools administration. Workshop participants were introduced to the concept of how to develop a framework for deliberative discussion, how to moderate deliberative forums and how to use the products of deliberation. Prior to the workshop, surveys and focus groups were used to identify the problems of greatest concern to educators within Ondo State. Included on the list were discipline, truancy, stealing and undue interference in school administration. Of these, truancy was the topic used by the group as a framing exercise.

Truancy is a serious problem, not only in Ondo State but throughout Nigeria. Truants are found virtually everywhere, including on the streets hawking merchandise, in game parlours playing video games and in the neighborhoods involved in anti-social behavior. It is one that has reached a crisis level and which has serious economic and leader-

ship implications for the nation. Truancy rates in some communities may reach as high as 20%.

Participants arrived at three different approaches for dealing with the problem. One approach assumes that the primary cause of the problem is that parents have abdicated their responsibilities to ensure that their children have the material and emotional support needed for them to attend school. Another approach assumes that the declining quality of academic standards and the status of educational infrastructure are at fault. The third approach assumes that a change in societal values is at the root of the problem. Each implies specific actions that can be taken to address the problem, each with its own costs and consequences.

Participants, after deliberating the issues, rejected the approach which focused on governmental action. This was somewhat surprising considering that during the first two days of the workshop, virtually all participants cited the need for governmental intervention when asked about how to deal with various problems facing the education industry. Their appreciation during the workshop that citizens have major roles as political actors is significant because it will help to move the country forward as it becomes more settled in the skin of a newly reactivated democracy

While in Nigeria, Flucas (with the blessings of **Chris Picard**, V.P., Academic Affairs) also attended a meeting at Ondo State University in Akungba-Akoko to begin the exploration of a possible faculty exchange program between C.O.D. and Ondo State University. The meeting was hosted by the acting Vice-Chancellor, **Prof. W.O. Ibukun**, and attended by all of the university administrators and department chairs.

Ondo State University currently has the Faculty



of Arts, Faculty of Education, Faculty of Law, Faculty of Science, Faculty of Social & Management Sciences. The following new faculties are proposed:

- Faculty of Engineering (2002/2003)
- Faculty of Agriculture (2004/2005)
- College of Medicine, including the Para-Clinical Department
- Faculty of Pharmacy
- Faculty of Dentistry
- Faculty of Medicine (Medicine & Surgery) (2005/2006), and
- Faculty of Environmental Technology (2008/2009).

Ondo State University was founded in 1982 in Ado-Ekiti, With the creation of Ekiti State from the old Ondo State, the University was relocated to Akungba-Akoko in 1999. It is presently located at a temporary site and is in the process of developing a master plan for its permanent facilities. Because of their current involvement in facilities planning, high on their list of priorities is making sure that their physical plant and technological infrastructure is sufficiently sophisticated to accommodate their current and future programs. They are especially concerned about the design of their library because of the critical role that it plays in supporting academic programs. COD's recent experience in these areas, including the construction of our co-generation plant and our solid foundation in the first two years of undergraduate education, makes us well suited to collaborate with them in these areas. Such a collaboration would not only widen the international focus for our faculty but could eventually involve student exchanges and international service learning opportunities.
