**FACULTY AND STAFF  
NEWS**

Retired C.O.D. President **Hal McAninch** and retired C.O.D. Professor **Roy Grundy** recently spent 10 days in Lithuania consulting and teaching at the National Institute of Management in Vilnius. They volunteered their services as part of a program sponsored by Rotary International.

**Richard Jarman**, Asst. Professor in Chemistry, visited Europe, including England, Germany and France on a MPDC funded trip, *The Role of Europe in Shaping Scientific Discovery 1800 – 1900*, in order to conduct research for development of global content in the science curriculum, as well as to evaluate the potential of institutes and museums as places to visit in a proposed FEL course to be launched in 2005. He visited Darwin's house, The Royal Institution and The Royal Society in London; the Roentgen Museum in Remscheid-Lennep, Germany; the Curie Institut and associated research laboratories in Paris, France. While on location, video material was acquired for the video conference, *International Studies in the Community College: Faculty, Courses, and the Curriculum*, the fifth satellite conference sponsored by CCID, ACIIE, ICCD and the League for Innovation Uplink on November 10, 2004.

**Werner Kriegelstein**, Professor of Philosophy & Religious Studies, spent fall quarter of his one year sabbatical leave in Europe. Werner led discussions and lectured at two colleges in Germany on American Education and Politics. In November he lectured at the University of Warsaw in Poland as a guest of the Philosophy Department, then traveled to Yalta in the Ukraine where he took part in the *Fourth International Course on Religion and Civil Society* and lectured on *The Sacred Wheel, How to Achieve Religious Tolerance in a Divided World*, organized by Tavrida National University in Simferopol. At the University of Warsaw, Werner lectured on *Truth, Concept or Experience*.

**Michael Perez** is the new Associate Director for Business, Professional, and Continuing Education. Michael's father was a career soldier, so his family moved frequently. Before his 18<sup>th</sup> birthday, Michael lived in Kansas, Alaska, North Carolina, California, Panama, Vermont, and Virginia. As a U.S. federal civilian in 1973, Michael worked for the Army Continuing Education System in various roles until he retired in 2003. During that period he traveled to Germany, Italy, Austria, Switzerland, Belgium, Luxemburg, Holland, England, Ireland, the Czech Republic, Bosnia, Hungary, Croatia, Kosovo, Macedonia, Egypt, Israel, Saudi Arabia, Kuwait, Spain, France, Somalia, Mexico, Canada, South Korea, the U.S. Virgin Islands, the Bahamas, and Puerto Rico. He lived for 19 years in Germany in Giessen, Stuttgart, Goeppingen, and Heidelberg.

His first degree is in German, which is also his second language. He taught German full-time for three years. He translated professional, academic journal articles from German to English and guest-lectured to doctoral students at the University of Tuebingen and the University of Bamberg.

In November he visited his daughter and her family, including his only grandson, in Yorkshire in northern England.

## PEACE CONFERENCE REFLECTIONS

*Olfat El-Mallakh, Adjunct Professor, attended a peace conference in Seoul, South Korea, August 18 - 22, 2004 on ESTABLISHING A WORLD CULTURE OF HEART: INNOVATIVE APPROACHES TO PEACE IN A CHANGING WORLD, attended by over 350 people from around the world. She was invited as a member of the Interreligious and International Federation for World Peace (IIFPW).*

*Among the many issues examined were the role of the family in establishing peaceful societies; models of leadership for a peaceful world; effective resolution of conflict through interreligious and international cooperation; and defining the core values of a Culture of Heart.*

*Here are some of her reflections from the conference:*

“Sitting in my hotel room on a comfortable bed and looking out the window, I am awed by the view of Seoul. An expansive panorama extends before me, ending in hills that embrace the big city. I am lodged on the 26<sup>th</sup> floor of the Lotte World Hotel Jamsil overlooking a river. Seoul is a modern city with many impressive highways and bridges and numerous high-rises.... That afternoon I was waiting for a ride to go to the old city with dirty roads, narrow streets, and smells from various food specialties.

I was amazed at the contrast. To get there we rode in a van with a large screen TV. On our way back we rode in a cab sedan with automated masseur seats that operated by inserting coins in a box!

We visited the Unification Observatory Tower near the site of the demilitarized zone. We saw North Korea on the other side. There was a striking difference between North and South Korea at that post. You could see the many wooded areas on the South Korean side, while the North Korean side was barren with no trees. Because of the severe shortage of fuel in North Korea they are cutting down trees to keep warm! We stood on the ‘Bridge of Freedom.’ How sad! One country, one people, two realities: an incentive for peace-makers.

Our working sessions concentrated on *Peace Initiatives: Focus on Israel and Palestine; Focus on Korea; The Media and World Peace; Non Governmental Organizations (NGOs) and World Peace; Developing a Curriculum for World Peace Education; United Nations Renewal and Trends in Global Governance.* I learned that a new council at the UN, the Interreligious Council, is engaged in very exciting work using religion to help better understand and solve the conflicts in the world.

Over 350 people attended the conference. At the opening of the conference I was asked to address the group. This was quite a surprise and left me speechless. I was preceded by the **Honorable Sir Lloyd Sandiford**, former Prime Minister of Barbados (1987-1994). I looked at all the attendees and realized that all of us, titled or not, were united in one goal, peace in the world. I was not nervous anymore. My words were simple but sincere, clear and powerful. I was grateful for the opportunity to address these people and the warm reception I received. That night I was treated as a celebrity.

I met many memorable people throughout the week: **Dr. and Mrs. Stanislaw Shushkevich**, the former Prime Minister of Belarus and his wife; **Mrs. Mufida H. Tuwebi Anag**, the General Director of the High Institute for Women’s Vocational Training in Libya; and **Dr. Josephine C. Dominguez**, Undersecretary of the Office of the Presidential Political Affairs of the Philippines.

**Ambassador Dr. Irma Eugenie Tobing Klein** from Suriname represented the President of the 58<sup>th</sup> General Assembly of the United Nations. She is a remarkable woman from whom I learned a lot. We disagreed about strategy. She was satisfied with small but sure steps forward. I wanted to take leaps of faith. We parted in agreement and confident that walls will come down and bridges will be built. As long as people communicate, are sincere and continue to persevere, good things will happen.”
