Alaska's Ring of Fire: Katmai and Lake Clark National Parks

Across the icy waters of the Cook Inlet, far from the population centers of south-central Alaska and along the notorious "ring of fire," are some of the most rugged, beautiful and inaccessible mountains in the world. Rich with more than 900 square miles of glaciers, more than a dozen active volcanoes, a rich history of early Alaska native and pioneer life, and a population of brown bears that outnumbers people, Katmai and Lake Clark national parks offer the hiker an unmatched wilderness experience. Join us as we hike among peaks, alpine lakes and waterfalls, visit the cabin of Alaska wilderness icon, Richard Proenneke, explore the "Valley of Ten Thousand Smokes," home of the largest volcanic event in the 20th century and experience the brown bears of Brooks Falls and the large salmon runs that feed them. Expect to hike five to eight miles a day. Classes: June 5 and July 15 (6 to 7:50 p.m.). Field Study: June 21 to 29. Fee: \$5,325 (includes airfare, shuttles, lodging, bush/float plane transportation, other ground transportation, park admissions, fees and some meals). Tuition is extra.

Biology of Bats

Bats make up almost one out of four mammal species worldwide yet they are often misunderstood and vilified. Learn about bats of the world and the varied adaptations that make them special. Topics to be covered will include bat diversity and natural history, myths about bats, their behaviors, their evolutionary history and relationship to other mammals, echolocation, how scientists study bats, conservation of bats and the threats they face, and what can be done to help bats. Field sessions will visit several local bat populations and get hands-on experience with research techniques such as mist-nets, acoustic monitoring, emergence counts, and radio tracking. Students will not be able to have direct contact with bats in the field but will participate in a meet-and-greet session with several live fruit bats in a classroom setting. An Act concerning education.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly: Section 5. The University Religious Observances Act is amended by adding Section 1.5 as follows: (110 ILCS 110/1.5 new)

Sec. 1.5. Absence of student due to religious beliefs.

(a) In this Section, "institution of higher learning" has the meaning ascribed to that term in the Higher Education Student Assistance Act.

(b) Any student in an institution of higher learning, other than a religious or denominational institution of higher learning, who is unable, because of his or her religious beliefs, to attend classes or to participate in any examination, study, or work requirement on a particular day shall be excused from any such examination, study, or work requirement and shall be provided with an opportunity to make up the examination, study, or work requirement that he or she may have missed because of such absence on a particular day; provided that the student notifies the faculty member or instructor well in advance of any anticipated absence or a pending conflict between a scheduled class and the religious observance and provided that the make-up examination, study, or work does not create an unreasonable burden upon the institution. No fees of any kind shall be charged by the institution for making available to the student such an opportunity. No adverse or prejudicial effects shall result to any student because of his or her availing himself or herself of the provisions of this Section.

(c) A copy of this Section shall be published by each institution of higher learning in the catalog of the institution containing the list of available courses.
