needs of community organizations. This 'win-win' method of instruction develops students' academic skills in the classroom, as well as a sense of civic responsibility and commitment to their community.

COD schedules conferences

The Conference and Event Services office oversees the rental of college rooms and facilities by non-COD groups. CES handles rentals for all buildings except for P.E. Building and McAninch Arts Center. Those departments handle their own rentals.

Most of the clients who rent out space are associations, professional organizations, corporations and religious groups as well as other schools.

In fiscal year 2006, CES provided services for over 1,100 events scheduled by 80 clients. In fiscal year 2007, CES provided services for over 1,200 events scheduled by 50 clients.

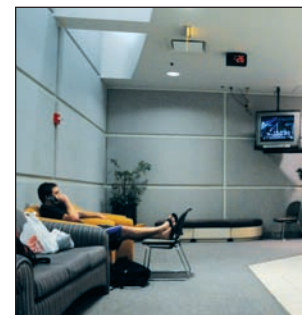
from standard classroom sizes to the whole of SRC 2800 which seats up to 500 people.

Staging and sound is available upon request and catering arrangements are coordinated on behalf of the client.

Prices vary based on the space and resources needed for the event and whether the

group is non-profit. Non-profit rental rates are discounted.

"The advantage to holding an event at COD as opposed to a hotel or conference center is the central location and the pricing," said Sandra Carbon-Sheldon, conference and events specialist. She can schedule events, catering and sound/staging.
