The College of DuPage is a community college district comprised of two campuses—the Central Campus and Open Campus (a college without walls). It was reorganized into a two campus district in August, 1979. The district serves 880,000 people within a 357 square mile geographic area. Headcount enrollment in the Fall of 1993 was more than 36,000 with an annualized FTE of more than 16,000. The district encompasses all of DuPage County and a minor portion of Cook and Will Counties.

During my tenure the college has built four buildings on the central campus with a fifth under construction. The square footage has more than doubled. In addition, three off campus sites have been purchased and two small (10,000 sq. ft.) regional centers built. The third site and building is in the planning stage.

August 1971–January 1979, President Joliet Junior College, Joliet, Illinois.

Joliet Junior College is the oldest public junior college in the nation. It serves the citizens of a district comprising parts of seven counties (1442 square miles) including almost all of Will and Grundy counties. The district encompasses one of the rapidly growing areas in the United States in terms of population and industry. It serves urban, suburban and rural areas including the metropolitan

area of Joliet, the commuters to Chicago who live in the northern portion of the district, and the rural areas of Will, Grundy, Kendall and Livingston counties.

Approximately 11,000 credit and non-credit students were enrolled during the Fall of 1978. The college operates under a negotiated agreement with faculty who are associated with the American Federation of Teachers. Joliet Junior College completed an extensive building program on a newly developed campus during my tenure. The district has programs in 26 different locations and on two campus attendance centers. The college also cooperated with three universities on programming at the Joliet campus. The people of the district voted a tax increase in May, 1977 by a 72.5 percent yes vote. It is significant to note that the local Joliet schools had not passed a tax increase in the past 10 years and only two Illinois community colleges had passed an increase on the first try in the 10 years previous to that time.

July 1969-July 1971, President, Jackson Community College, Jackson, Michigan.

Jackson Community College is an old institution with a comprehensive program serving the citizens of Jackson County, Michigan. In 1970-71 approximately 3,600 head count students were enrolled. The district operates under a negotiated agreement with faculty who are affiliated with the Michigan Education Association and the National Education Association. Two new buildings were planned and built during the three years I served the district.

June 1968-June 1969, Vice President of Instruction and President-elect at Jackson Community College, Jackson, Michigan.

June 1966-June 1968. Jefferson College, Hillsboro, Missouri.

Dean of Administration, which also included faculty leadership, improvement of instruction and recruitment of faculty. During this period several experimental programs were developed in the area of instruction, including the developmental program for educationally disadvantaged students and a summer college preview for new students.

June 1964–June 1966, Jefferson College, a new community college, Hillsboro, Missouri.

Dean of Administration and Acting Business Manager, Responsibilities included faculty supervision, student activities and buildings and grounds. During this time, I prepared grant proposals for the Higher Education Facilities Act, let bids and purchased all the furniture and supplies, established the bookstore and supervised maintenance of buildings and grounds. I also worked with the faculty on the improvement of instruction.

Before the arrival of the Dean of Technical Education in June, 1966, I was responsible for development in this area of the curriculum, including the writing of the proposal for the area vocational school. I was also responsible for the development of the library.
