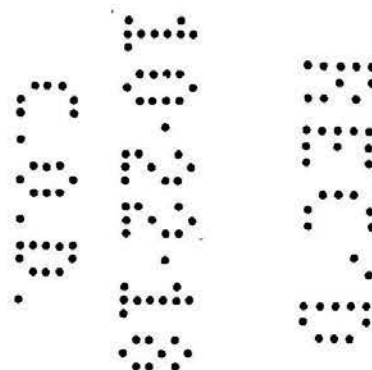

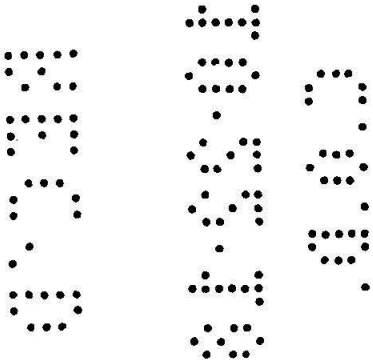

## A Safer Naper: Be Aware and Be Safe

The City of Naperville consistently ranks as one of the safest cities of its size in which to live, raise a family and retire. The awareness and crime prevention efforts of Naperville's citizens are major factors in this success.

As October is National Crime Prevention Month, it is fitting to focus this month's "A Safer Naper" campaign on what residents can do to help prevent crime in our community.

The most significant defense against crime is awareness through education. The Naperville Police Department maintains a website, is active on social media, regularly works with the local media and utilizes the City's Naper Notify system to disseminate information to the public.

Residents are encouraged to use these resources in addition to the Public Safety Incident Map to stay informed as to criminal activity in Naperville. The map allows users to view police incidents based on location, type and time frame. The map is updated at various times throughout the day as reports are approved by supervisors and is available at [www.naperville.il.us/publicsafetyincidentmap](http://www.naperville.il.us/publicsafetyincidentmap).

It is also important to remember that while Naperville is a safe city, it is not a crime free city. Active crime prevention strategies, such as Lock It or Lose It and See Something, Say Something are also critical. Removing the opportunity for crime or being aware of what constitutes suspicious activity go a long way toward reducing your risk of victimization.

In that regard, the Naperville Police Department introduced Paws on Patrol earlier this year. Through this dog walker watch program, residents are taught what constitutes suspicious activity and then encouraged to be vigilant of their surroundings while out "on patrol" with their canines for their daily walks. ### Trick-or-Treat Safety Tips

This year, Halloween falls on Wednesday, October 31. There is no City ordinance designating Trick-or-Treating hours for children, but the Naperville Police Department would like to offer these Halloween safety tips to ensure that Halloween is a fun and festive time for all.

#### Adults

- Welcome trick-or-treaters with your porch or exterior lights on.
- Call 9-1-1 immediately to report suspicious activity.
- Do not give homemade or unwrapped treats to children.
- Inspect all candy and discard any homemade or unwrapped treats.
- Visit [www.naperville.il.us/npdinvestigations](http://www.naperville.il.us/npdinvestigations) for a registered sex offender list.

#### Kids and Teens

- Make sure costumes are flame retardant and short to prevent trips.
- Try make-up instead of a mask and avoid "terrorist type" costumes and those requiring weapons.
- Make sure to wear light colors or put reflective tape on costumes. Glow sticks are also a fun way to light the way.
- Practice safety in numbers and travel with older children or adults.
- Do not go inside anyone's home. Remain on the porch at all times.
- Do not accept rides from strangers.
- Look both ways before crossing the street and cross at corners only.
- Young children should end trick-or-treating when it begins to get dark.
- Do not take shortcuts through back yards, alleys or parks.
- Do not eat any treats until they have been inspected.

### Leaf Collection Begins in October

Bulk curbside leaf collection will take place in October and November. The first two-week cycle is scheduled to begin on October 15. The second two-week cycle is scheduled to begin October 29, and the final cycle is set to kick off on November 12. The entire program should be complete by November 21.

Residents should rake leaves into the street by 6 a.m. on the first day of the collection cycle. Crews will collect leaves once during each collection cycle. Leaf volumes and weather uncertainties make it impossible for the City to guarantee curbside leaf collection for a specific day.

### Yard Waste Collection

Yard waste stickers for bagged yard waste are not required for pick up between October 29 and December 14, 2018.

To participate, put bags of yard waste on the curb on your regular garbage collection day. Branches and other yard waste that are tied into bundles require a sticker at all times.

All bagged and bundled yard waste collection ends December 14, 2018 and will resume on March 18, 2019. Yard waste stickers will be required again on all bagged and bundled yard waste at that time.

## Open Data Naperville

Naperville's Open Data program is evolving, expanding and opening up new possibilities. In the last month, the City of Naperville announced the largest - and perhaps most diverse - release of data since the launch of Naperville's open data portal in 2017.

The list of published datasets spans years of data and represents various operations in nearly every city department, including Pace and Metra ridership numbers, energy consumption, occupancy data in downtown parking garages, public safety incidents and the amount of garbage and recycling collected throughout the city. All of this, and much more, can be found at [data.naperville.il.us](http://data.naperville.il.us).

It's the use of these datasets in analysis and storytelling, however, that really highlights the evolution of Naperville's open data program.

Are you a utility customer interested to know why there's a phosphorus surcharge collected on water bills? There's a story page for that! The new Nutrient Removal page on the open data portal explains what nutrients are and why they must be removed from wastewater, how regulations have become stricter and how the City is planning ahead to make changes to the Springbrook Water Reclamation Center to comply.

Have you ever wondered whether special events near downtown Naperville have an adverse effect on downtown businesses? The open data portal houses the raw data used by city staff to study the economic and parking impacts that large-scale events have on the downtown. The results are explained and displayed in easy-to-decipher visualizations, and the raw data is provided for others to take and decipher and use themselves.

Are you passionate about the environment and curious what the city's doing to provide more sustainable services? The annual progress report for the Sustainability Plan adopted in 2010 is now featured on the open data portal as a fully electronic set of story pages that combine the look of a magazine-style report complete with pictures, graphics and storytelling with the technical benefit of access to raw data.

As this recent release of reportable data and accompanying stories shows, the analysis and use of data has the ability to improve operations and foster understanding. The City of Naperville's open data program will continue to play a crucial role in the city's ongoing commitment to transparency, innovation and evidence-based decision making. ## Coming Soon: Naperville Jaycees Park

On September 18, the City of Naperville and the Naperville Area Chamber of Commerce jointly hosted a groundbreaking ceremony for the Naperville Jaycees Park that will soon be located on the north lawn of the Municipal Center.

Once constructed, the free park will include accessible and stepped entrances, several types of seating, tables, charging stations, USB ports and outlets. WiFi will be provided throughout the park, and canopies and trellises will provide sun protection. Eco-friendly amenities include permeable pavers and rain gardens, and the energy will come from solar panels installed on the roof of the Municipal Center.
