## Student Feedback for Teaching and Learning: Midterm & End-of-Semester

BIC 1425

<u>REGISTER</u> End-of-semester evaluations are problematic for a whole host of reasons, not the least of which is that we're seeking feedback after all the teaching and learning is done from "people who are utterly fried and miserable and going to lash out." Educator and author Jessamyn Neuhaus insists we can "counteract that with getting a ton of feedback from students [throughout] the whole semester, cultivating a culture of constructive, productive feedback."

Not only will a culture of constructive feedback contribute to more productive final evaluations, but incorporating feedback processes throughout your course encourages student metacognition, gives you opportunities to make informed changes to your course, and provides you with valuable insight into student perceptions of the learning environment.

In this workshop, we'll be focusing on midterm feedback for metacognition and approaches for interpreting end-of-semester evaluations. Participants will leave with midterm feedback questions, an approach for soliciting constructive feedback from students, and a plan for end-of-term evaluations.
